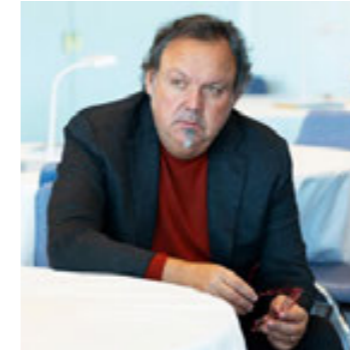

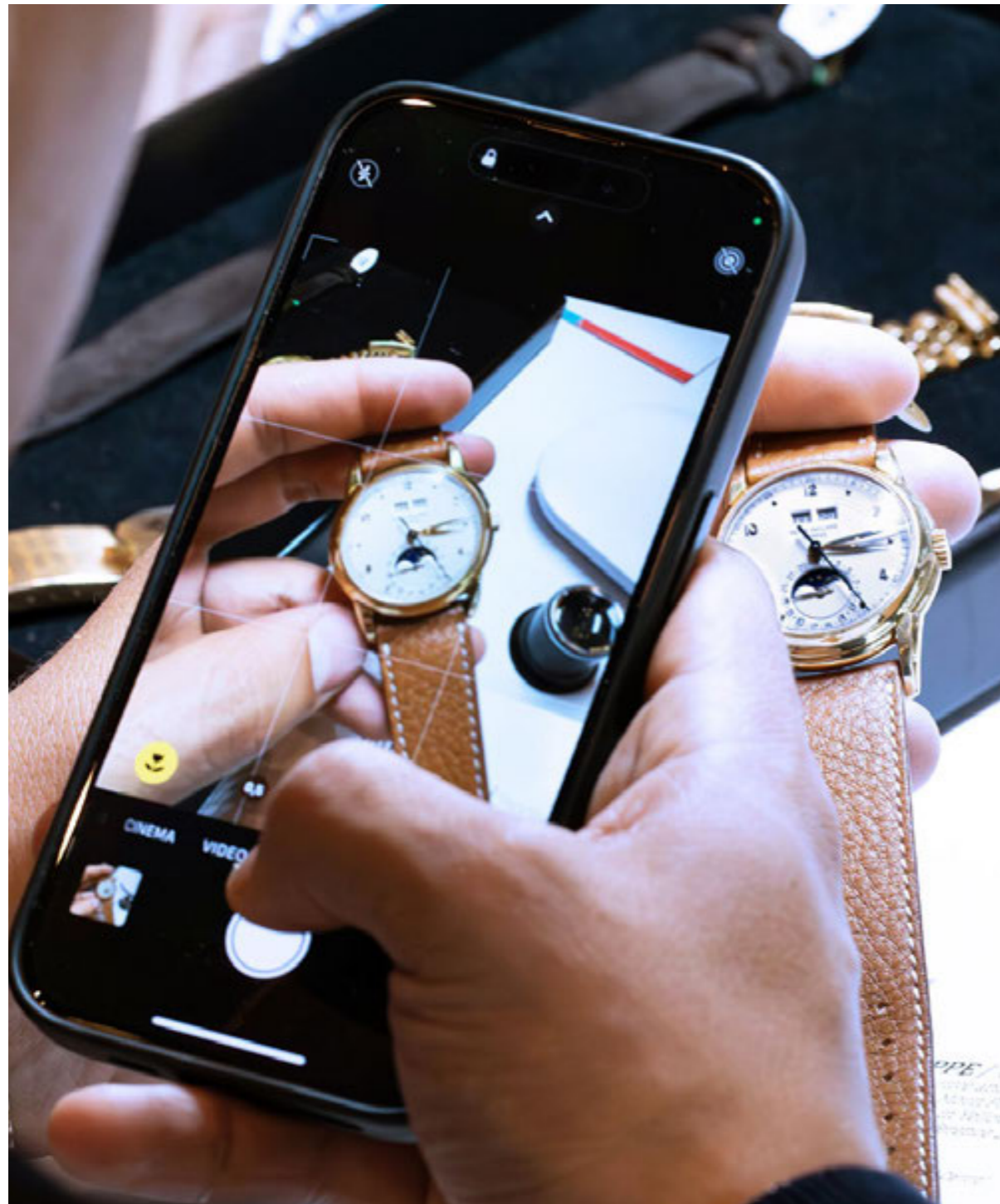

**ROLEX / An incredibly rare and very unusual, "Half-Hooded Lugs", chronograph manual wristwatch in steel, with black double-scale snail dial, reference 2919.**

A watch that speaks in hushed, authoritative tones, this Rolex reference 2919 belongs to that rarefied category of early chronographs where design, scarcity and historical charm converge with remarkable coherence. Produced in 1937 in an exceedingly small series of apparently only 35 examples, this non-Oyster reference was offered in either stainless steel or yellow gold, yet examples have surfaced only sparingly over the decades. To the best of current scholarship, this particular watch represents just

the fourth example to appear publicly at international auction, and notably, the first recorded with a black dial, a detail that dramatically enhances both its visual presence and its rarity. The case, preserved in excellent overall condition, displays beautifully defined proportions, with strong, faceted lugs that retain their original geometry. These distinctive "half-hooded" lugs, an early and unusual Rolex signature, lend the watch a sculptural quality, further complemented by the characteristic olive-shaped pushers, themselves a subtle but telling hallmark of the period. The caseback engravings remain crisp and legible, reinforcing the watch's state of preservation. The dial is where this reference truly reveals its depth. Rendered in black, it features an outer telemeter scale paired with an inner "snail" tachymeter, an arrangement both visually captivating and technically evocative of the era's fascination with precision and measurement. The harmonious layout, punctuated by elegant Arabic and baton numerals with balanced sub-dials, offers a richness that rewards prolonged observation. Fitted with a steel bracelet and accompanied by its presentation box, this reference 2919 stands not merely as a rare Rolex chronograph, but as a quietly important witness to the brand's formative years in complicated watchmaking. For the discerning collector, it represents an opportunity that is unlikely to present itself often, if ever again in such compelling guise.

The Rolex Precision reference 9522 Disco Volante offers a different perspective on Rolex during the 1960s. While the brand was establishing its reputation through professional tool watches, a quieter line of refined dress pieces continued to develop alongside, often with more experimental design language. This reference 9522 is a particularly interesting example. Its so-called "Disco Volante" case, defined by its wide, rounded profile and absence of lugs, gives the watch a distinctive presence. The proportions feel deliberate: a broad dial opening framed

by a relatively thin, engraved bezel, creating a strong visual impact while remaining elegant on the wrist. The present example is further elevated by its black lacquered dial, a configuration far less common than lighter tones. The contrast between the glossy surface and the yellow gold case enhances legibility while giving the watch a more contemporary character. Examples of the reference 9522 are already scarce, and those fitted with black dials even more so. What makes this watch appealing today is its position within the Rolex catalogue: not a tool watch, but a design-driven piece that shows a more understated and less explored side of the brand. It remains a compelling choice for collectors seeking something both distinctive and rooted in Rolex's broader history.

The Rolex Cellini reference 4650 belongs to a lesser-explored yet highly expressive chapter of Rolex production, when the maison ventured beyond its tool-watch identity to explore form, material, and elegance in a more creative and decorative direction. During the 1970s, the Cellini line became a laboratory of design, where unconventional shapes and rare materials were combined with the same

precision that defined Rolex's more utilitarian models. The present reference 4650 is a perfect embodiment of this philosophy. Its angular case, executed in yellow gold, is integrated seamlessly with the bracelet, creating a cohesive and architectural presence on the wrist. What immediately distinguishes this watch is its dial. Crafted in wood, it introduces a natural texture rarely encountered in Rolex production. Each dial is inherently unique, with subtle variations in tone and grain, offering a warmth and depth that contrasts beautifully with the brilliance of the surrounding materials. The diamond-set bezel frames the dial with discretion, adding light without overwhelming the composition. The overall design remains balanced and restrained, with clean lines and minimal indications, allowing the materials themselves to define the watch's character. This interplay between organic and precious elements reflects the experimental spirit of the period. Preserved in attractive condition, this Cellini reference 4650 stands as a refined and distinctive example of Rolex's ability to reinterpret luxury through design, an elegant reminder of a time when creativity and craftsmanship came together in unexpected and highly collectible forms.

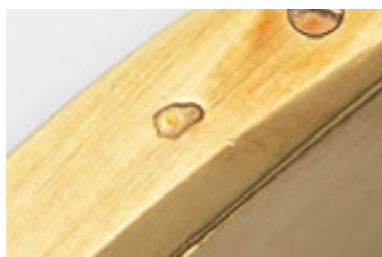

Introduced in 1921, the Tank Cintrée represents one of Cartier's most refined explorations of form during the golden age of Art Deco design. The name Cintrée, French for "curved" or "arched", refers to the watch's defining characteristic: its elongated case gently bows across the wrist, transforming the strict geometry of the original Tank into a more fluid and ergonomic silhouette. Conceived not only as an aesthetic exercise but also as an advancement in wearability, the Cintrée remains among the most sophisticated interpretations of the Tank ever produced. The present example perfectly illustrates the architectural elegance that distinguishes the model. Narrower and more elongated than the standard Tank, the curved

case follows the contour of the wrist with remarkable naturalism, creating a sense of visual lightness despite its assertive proportions. Seen in profile, the softly arched construction gives the watch an almost sculptural quality, a hallmark of Cartier's experimentation with geometric forms during the early 1920s. Its dial preserves the classic Cartier vocabulary established in Paris during the inter-war years: black Roman numerals, chemin de fer minute track and blued steel hands arranged within the elongated rectangular frame. These restrained details, combined with the purity of the Cintrée's proportions, embody the balance between modernity and elegance that defined Cartier's horological creations of the period. Of particular significance is the French-made case bearing the hallmark of the eagle's head, the official French assay mark for 18 carat gold. Such hallmarks confirm French production and remain highly valued by collectors for their historical integrity and direct association with Cartier Paris manufacture during its most celebrated era. Developed in close collaboration with Edmond Jaeger, whose firm supplied movements to Cartier throughout the early twentieth century, the Tank Cintrée belongs to a remarkable generation of avant-garde Cartier designs that also included the Tank Allongée and Cloche. Produced in comparatively limited numbers and long regarded as one of the maison's purest wristwatch designs, the Cintrée today stands not merely as a watch, but as an enduring icon of twentieth-century decorative arts.

The Tank Louis Cartier, here in yellow gold, distills the essence of the original 1917 design into its purest form: parallel brancards, balanced dial, and an elegance that feels almost inevitable. There is nothing superfluous, and yet nothing missing. The guilloché dial, with its subtle radiating pattern, catches the light just enough to animate the surface without disturbing its composure. What elevates this piece further is its status as a limited production. Bearing the engraving "N° 0010" to its caseback, it belongs to a small and deliberate series,

produced in circa 2005, at a time when Cartier was revisiting its heritage with renewed sensitivity. The reference 2654H remains faithful to traditional watchmaking codes: a manually wound movement, slender proportions, and a tactile relationship between wearer and mechanism. It is a watch that asks to be engaged with, rather than simply worn. Its condition only reinforces its appeal. Preserved with care, the crispness of the case, the clarity of the hallmarks, and the depth of the dial all contribute to a sense of integrity, something increasingly difficult to encounter. Ultimately, this is not a watch that seeks attention. It rewards it. A restrained, thoughtful execution of an icon, made rarer by its limited nature, and more compelling by the quiet confidence with which it carries its history.

An elegant and distinctive creation from Cartier's celebrated "Louis Cartier" collection, the Gondole Jumbo Horizontale reference 9705 epitomizes the maison's flair for transforming everyday inspiration into refined horological form. Conceived in the 1970s, this generously proportioned wristwatch stands out for its unusual horizontal orientation, contrasting with the more commonly encountered vertical variant, and for its softly curved profile, evocative of the graceful lines of

Venetian gondolas. The yellow gold case, notable for its elongated and fluid silhouette, was manufactured by Guillo & Co., as confirmed by the poinçon de maître bearing the number 121 inside the hammerhead hallmark in the caseback. This respected casemaker supplied components not only to Cartier, but also to prestigious houses such as Rolex, Vacheron Constantin and Longines, further enhancing the historical interest of the present example. The external hallmarks and engravings remain crisp and well-defined, a highly desirable characteristic that suggests the watch has not been subjected to excessive or repeated polishing over time. Additionally, the presence of the two owl import marks denotes its registration in France as an 18K gold timepiece. The dial is quintessentially Cartier: a white background adorned with elegant black Roman numerals and a chemin de fer minute track, signed "Paris" at 6 o'clock, a detail prized by collectors for its association with early and more exclusive production. Combining sculptural design, historical relevance, and excellent state of preservation, this Gondole Jumbo Horizontale offers a compelling opportunity to acquire a rare and characterful example of Cartier's creative legacy.

Dating to the 1970s, this elegant wristwatch by Omega captures a period of remarkable creative freedom, when the maison explored the intersection between horology

and high jewellery through bold materials and distinctive forms. In this decade, Omega expanded its design vocabulary beyond purely functional timekeeping instruments, embracing a more decorative and architectural approach. Geometric cases, integrated bracelets, and unconventional dial layouts became defining elements, reflecting the broader aesthetic shifts of the era. This timepiece exemplifies that direction, where the watch is conceived as both an object of design and a piece of wearable art. Crafted in white gold, the case is defined by its sharp, faceted geometry and is seamlessly paired with an integrated bracelet featuring a finely textured finish. The dial is arranged in a striking quadrant composition, alternating polished black onyx with pavé-set diamond sections. Accompanying the watch, a pair of matching cufflinks and a ring repeat the same distinctive motif, combining onyx and diamonds in a coherent and harmonious design. The presence of this complete set underscores Omega's vision of coordinated luxury during the period, extending its craftsmanship beyond the wrist into a broader lifestyle expression.

The Santos Octagon reference 2695, produced in the 1980s, offers a distinctive alternative to the classic Santos Carrée. Executed in yellow gold, the model preserves the architectural essence of the Santos while introducing a more jewel-like and decorative expression, defined by its octagonal geometry. The bezel is set with a continuous line of brilliant-cut rubies, transforming the familiar

Santos silhouette into a more flamboyant and precious statement. This gem-set theme extends seamlessly to the integrated gold bracelet, where rubies replace the traditional exposed screws, creating a refined and cohesive aesthetic. Even the crown is reimagined, featuring a ruby cabochon in place of the customary sapphire, further emphasizing the singularity of the present configuration. The dial remains faithful to Cartier's timeless design language: a white surface with bold Roman numerals and an outer chemin de fer minute track. The layout is completed by blued-steel hands and a discreet date aperture at 3 o'clock, ensuring both clarity and functionality within a highly decorative composition. The dial further displays a subtle "spider" effect, with a fine network of hairline that radiate across the surface, adding a distinctive layer of visual texture and vintage character. Powered by an automatic movement, the Santos Octagon combines everyday practicality with elevated jewellery watchmaking, embodying the dual identity that has long defined Cartier's most successful creations. Rich in character and uncommon in execution, the reference 2695 stands as a compelling and highly collectible variation within the Santos family, appealing to connoisseurs of both horology and decorative design.

Dating to the 1930s, this Omega chronograph represents a fascinating chapter in the brand's technical evolution, built around a movement that laid the groundwork for some of the most celebrated calibres to follow. At its core is the legendary caliber 33.3, a manually wound chronograph movement developed in collaboration with Lemania, widely regarded as a cornerstone in the development of high-grade chronographs. Its configuration, operated through a single button integrated into the crown and reset through

the one on the crown, offers a pure and intuitive chronograph experience, characteristic of early wrist chronographs before the widespread adoption of dual pushers at 2 and 4 o'clock. The watch is distinguished by its striking multi-scale enamel dial, a feature that immediately captures attention. The intricate "snail" tachymeter scales, rendered in blue and green, are complemented by a red telemeter track, creating a vibrant yet highly functional display. These scales allowed the wearer to measure both speed and distance, underscoring the watch's utilitarian origins. The two-register layout maintains visual harmony, while the finely printed numerals and elegant hands enhance legibility. Housed in a 39 mm staybrite steel case, the watch offers a strong wrist presence, especially for its era. The stepped case design adds depth and character, while the snap-on caseback preserves the clean lines of the profile. Well preserved and rich in historical significance, this example stands as a compelling piece for collectors who appreciate early chronograph innovation.

A study in restraint and timeless elegance, this Vacheron Constantin open-face pocket watch, reference 7323, embodies the refined aesthetic language of the 1970s. Crafted in white gold, its softly rounded case is distinguished by clean, uninterrupted lines and a smooth, satin-like finish that enhances its understated sophis-

tication. The dial follows the same philosophy of simplicity, offering a serene, uncluttered display punctuated only by slender Roman numerals and fine baton hands. The absence of superfluous elements allows the purity of the design to take center stage, resulting in a composition that feels both modern and classically inspired. The proportions are carefully balanced, giving the watch a quiet presence that rewards close observation. Its minimalist character is complemented by a manual-winding movement, reinforcing a traditional approach to timekeeping while maintaining a discreet profile. The elegant bow and crown, subtly integrated at the top of the case, further contribute to the harmonious silhouette. Preserved in excellent overall condition, the watch retains crisp definition across its surfaces, with the dial remaining particularly well kept. Accompanied by its original presentation box, guarantee and tag, this example offers a complete and appealing set for collectors. Combining purity of form with the prestige of one of Geneva's most respected maisons, this pocket watch stands as a refined object of both function and design, an expression of quiet luxury rather than overt display.

Few creations capture the sensual audacity of post-war jewellery design quite like the Serpenti, and in this remarkable example, the dialogue between Roman design and Swiss horology reaches an especially fascinating crescendo. Conceived by Bulgari at the height of its creative ascendancy, the coiling serpent, an eternal symbol of rebirth and seduction, becomes here both ornament and

timekeeper, its sinuous form wrapping effortlessly around the wrist with hypnotic elegance. This particular piece is distinguished not only by its sculptural presence, but by its exceptional construction. The articulated yellow gold body is composed of finely chased, scale-like elements, their alternating tones creating a rich, almost lifelike texture that plays beautifully with the light. The flexibility of the bracelet is nothing short of extraordinary, a testament to Bulgari's mastery of high jewellery techniques, allowing the serpent to coil naturally and comfortably. At its head, the discreetly integrated watch reveals a signed dial, its minimalist layout framed within the stylised serpent's mouth, an ingenious and playful design detail that underscores the piece's dual identity. Most compelling, however, is the signature of Omega found across the case, dial, and movement, an increasingly rare and highly collectible configuration. During this period, Bulgari often collaborated with leading Swiss manufactures to supply the technical heart of its creations, and Omega's involvement elevates this Serpenti beyond mere jewellery into the realm of serious horology. The result is a captivating hybrid: Roman artistry infused with Swiss precision, a jewel that tells time as beautifully as it adorns.

Gübelin of Lucerne here offers a creation that speaks in a distinctly architectural language: restrained, geometric, and quietly luxurious. Dating to circa 1930s, this open-face pocket watch is housed in an octagonal platinum case whose faceted edges recall the refined geometry of the Art Deco period. The choice of platinum, still relatively uncommon at the time, lends the piece both physical substance and a discreet, almost understated nobility. The dial presents a compelling contrast between refinement and character. Set against a silvery ground, the

applied Breguet numerals introduce a sense of depth and craftsmanship rarely encountered in such restrained designs. Equally noteworthy are the hands: delicately pierced and articulated, almost jewel-like in their construction, they elevate the dial from simple time display to something approaching ornament. The geometric, almost sculptural bow, angular and purposeful, echoes the octagonal case, reinforcing the watch's cohesive design language. Altogether, this Gübelin pocket watch is less about ostentation and more about nuance: a refined object where material, form, and detail converge. Chopard here departs entirely from the conventions of classical watchmaking, offering instead a bold exercise in sculpture: an object that sits as much in the realm of jewelry as it does in horology. 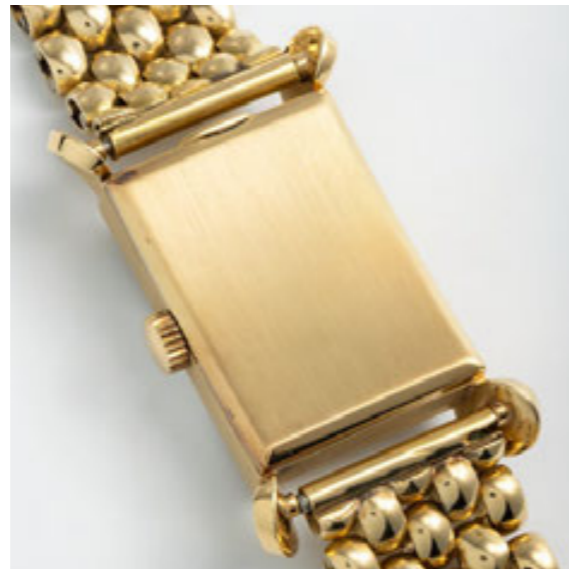

Turning the watch over, the engraving confirms its exclusivity, numbered within the series (N°2/5) and clearly marked "mécanique," a reminder of its manually wound movement, in keeping with the classical spirit of the model. What makes this watch particularly appealing is its restraint. The customization is evident, yet never excessive. It remains unmistakably a Tank Américaine, but with a layer of narrative that connects Cartier's design language to a specific moment in a retailer's history. In a category often defined by subtle variations, this example stands out for its rarity, provenance, and thoughtful execution.

Closely tied to a spirit of exploration and technical precision, the Eberhard "Mod. Magini" occupies a distinctive place within the brand's historical production. Its name traces back to Publio Magini, a member of an Italian scientific expedition, highlighting the functional purpose such instruments once served in demanding environments. The earliest "Sistema Magini" timepieces were conceived as advanced tools, often featuring split-seconds chronograph mechanisms and multiple calendar indications. Designed for professional use, they emphasized legibility and reli-

ability above all else. As the concept evolved, Eberhard continued to produce limited watches bearing the Magini designation, either fully written or abbreviated as "Mod. Magini" or "Mod. Mag," expanding the line across both pocket watches and wristwatches. The present example represents a refined iteration of this lineage. Encased in steel and chromed metal, it retains a purposeful, instrument-like character while adopting a cleaner and more accessible configuration. The dial is dominated by a 24-hour scale, ensuring clarity at a glance, while the discreet date aperture adds practical functionality. Blued steel hands introduce a touch of elegance, standing out crisply against the light dial. Although it does not feature the split-seconds complication of earlier models, it remains equipped with a chronograph function, preserving its identity as a precision timing device. The overall design balances utility and restraint, reflecting a period when watches were built with clear intent. Preserved in excellent condition, this "Mod. Magini" is not only a compelling example of Eberhard's technical heritage but also a piece imbued with historical narrative, appealing to collectors who value both function and provenance.

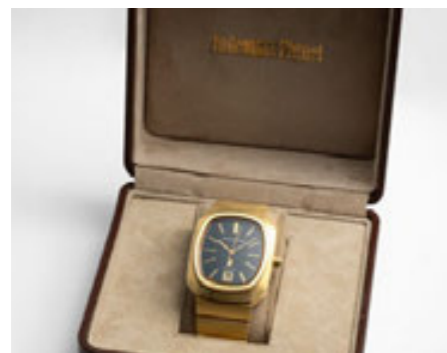

Emerging during one of the most transformative periods in watchmaking, the Audemars Piguet reference 6001 reflects a moment when tradition met cutting-edge innovation. Introduced in 1974, it marked a significant milestone for the brand as its first model powered by a quartz movement, embracing the technological shift that defined the era. Rather than following a purely conventional path, Audemars Piguet approached quartz with the

same commitment to refinement seen in its mechanical creations. The reference 6001 was fitted with a highly advanced movement derived from Omega's Megaquartz technology, renowned at the time for its exceptional precision, capable of maintaining accuracy within a second per month. Reworked and designated as caliber 2510, it positioned the watch among the most accurate wristwatches of its generation. Visually, the model captures the bold yet elegant spirit of the 1970s. Its case presents a softened, cushion-like interpretation of an octagonal form, combining geometric strength with fluid lines. This harmonious design is paired with an integrated bracelet, creating a seamless and distinctly modern profile on the wrist. The dial remains understated, with a deep black surface that highlights the applied baton indexes and matching hands. A date aperture at 6 o'clock adds symmetry and practicality without disturbing the overall balance. The contrast between the dark dial and the warmth of yellow gold enhances the watch's presence while maintaining a refined aesthetic. Produced in limited numbers between the mid-1970s and the end of the decade, the reference 6001 remains a relatively elusive model today. This yellow gold example stands out not only for its condition but also as a compelling representation of Audemars Piguet's early exploration into high-precision quartz watchmaking.

The Eberhard Pre Extra-Fort Rattrapante represents an extraordinary and seldom-seen chapter in the evolution of complicated chronographs: an exceptional synthesis of technical ingenuity, oversized proportions, and refined aesthetics that places it among the most fascinating Eberhard creations ever produced. Building on a legacy that began in 1919 with its first chronograph, Eberhard rapidly established itself as a pioneer in the field. By 1935, it introduced the two-pusher system, and just a few years later, the highly complex split-seconds (rattrapante) complication. The present example stands out for its unusual

and highly sophisticated configuration: a pusher chronograph with the start, stop, and reset functions integrated directly into the winding crown, while a separate upper pusher controls the split-seconds mechanism, allowing intermediate timing without interrupting the main chronograph. Interestingly, the pusher at 4 o'clock serves a single, unusual purpose: when slid, it locks the chronograph, preventing it from operating. Encased in stainless steel, the watch features a remarkably large 40 mm case, an impressive dimension for its era, further enhancing its presence and rarity. The case is preserved in outstanding condition, retaining its sharp stepped bezel, well-defined lugs, and original oval pushers, all hallmarks of careful preservation. The black gilt dial is equally compelling, combining depth and clarity with an elegant tachymeter scale, three well-balanced subsidiary registers, and painted Roman numerals. The warm patina adds character while maintaining exceptional legibility, making it both visually striking and historically authentic. This Eberhard split-seconds chronograph stands as a true connoisseur's piece, an important, museum-worthy example that embodies the peak of early chronograph innovation and remains one of the most captivating vintage rattrapante watches to appear on the market.

The A. Lange & Söhne Lange 1 was introduced in 1994 as part of the brand's historic relaunch, alongside three other models, marking the rebirth of the Saxon manufacture. From the outset, it distinguished itself through its

Featuring an off-centre time display, subsidiary seconds, power reserve indicator and the signature oversized date, the Lange 1 has since been produced in numerous variations of case materials and dial configurations, while preserving its unmistakable identity. Introduced in 1977 to celebrate the 222nd anniversary of the Manufacture, the Vacheron Constantin 222

A quietly groundbreaking reference, the Patek Philippe reference 2597 captures a moment when watchmaking began to adapt to a world that was suddenly becoming smaller. Air travel was no longer a novelty, and the need to track time across borders was no longer theoretical, it was practical, immediate, and increasingly essential.

Rather than opting for a visually complex solution, Patek Philippe chose restraint, relying on ingenuity rather than display. Developed with the input of Louis Cottier, a master of time zone mechanisms, the watch offers a remarkably intuitive system. With two discreet pushers integrated into the case, the local hour can be advanced or set back in one-hour increments, entirely independently from the minutes. It is a solution that feels obvious today, yet at the time it was both novel and technically demanding, so much so that it was protected by a dedicated Swiss patent. This example belongs to the second iteration of the model, introduced in the early 1960s, and distinguished by its additional hour indication. The dial remains beautifully restrained, almost deceptively simple, concealing the sophistication beneath. Applied markers, dauphine hands, and a small seconds register create a composition that is both elegant and purpose-driven. The yellow gold case, made by one of Patek Philippe's trusted suppliers, Antoine Gerlach, has aged with remarkable patination and charm, showing gentle signs of life rather than wear. Importantly, it retains crisp hallmarks and well-defined proportions. Watches of this reference rarely surface, particularly in this configuration. An intriguing departure from conventional rectangular forms, the Patek Philippe reference 2456 illustrates Patek Philippe's early exploration of more expressive case architecture during the post-war period. While still firmly rooted in classical watchmaking, this model introduces a subtle tension between restraint and sculptural ambition, an approach that would later define much of the brand's shaped watch production in the

decades to follow. Its most compelling feature lies in the case itself. Crafted in yellow gold and manufactured by Baumgartner (poinçon de maître number 2), the profile is distinguished by gently concave flanks that flare outward, creating a sense of expansion and movement along the wrist. This nuanced geometry transforms what might otherwise be a simple rectangular watch into an object of quiet complexity, where light plays continuously across its surfaces. The dial, by contrast, adopts a deliberately understated role. Clean and balanced, with discreet hour markers and a subsidiary seconds register, it provides clarity without competing with the case. This deliberate hierarchy, where form takes precedence over ornament, signals a broader stylistic shift that began in the 1950s and would flourish in the 1960s and 1970s, as designers increasingly favored bold cases paired with minimal displays. Notably, the present example retains strong definition throughout its case, preserving the original intent of its design. With only a limited number of examples believed to exist, the reference 2456 stands as a compelling testament to Patek Philippe's willingness to innovate within the boundaries of elegance.

The Endeavour Flying Hours stands as one of its most intriguing departures, reinterpreting a centuries-old display in a thoroughly contemporary language. Introduced in 2018 and produced in a highly exclusive series of just 60 pieces, this model explores the wandering hours complication with characteristic restraint. Rather than animating the entire dial, Moser anchors three rotating hour satellites around the periphery, each advancing in sequence while indicating the minutes along a curved track. The result is a display that feels both mechanical and organic, fluid in motion, yet remarkably legible once understood. Visually, the watch is quintessentially Moser. The deep blue fumé dial, free of any overt branding, shifts in tone with the light, creating a sense of depth that contrasts beautifully with the sculptural elements of the display. The movement, visible through the sapphire case back, adheres to the manufacture's high standards, combining technical sophistication with refined finishing. The architecture is clean, with a focus on balance and proportion, while the innovative module driving the satellite hours adds a layer of mechanical intrigue. Both unconventional and highly considered, the Endeavour Flying Hours offers a compelling alternative to traditional timekeeping.

Few watches occupy a space so special that their mere appearance on the market becomes an event in itself. The

present example is one of them. Combining iconic status with a state of preservation bordering on the extraordinary, it represents an opportunity that may surface only once in a generation. To encounter a yellow gold GMT-Master reference 6542 is already uncommon; to find one retaining its original bakelite bezel, crisp case geometry, original dial, period bracelet, and complete set of documents is something altogether different. Quite simply, it is the kind of watch that defines collections. Produced in the mid-1950s, at the dawn of intercontinental jet travel, the reference 6542 was conceived as a navigational instrument. Yet in gold, it transcends function and enters the realm of distinction. Designed with Pan Am, the GMT-Master was inherently a steel tool-watch, practical, purposeful. Gold, however, was bold, unconventional, almost defiant. For that reason, only a minute fraction were cased in 18-karat yellow gold. Rarity alone does not define this watch—its condition does. The case is exceptional, with full proportions, crisp bevels, and sharp edges rarely seen today. Equally remarkable is the survival of its original bakelite bezel, intact and free of the fractures so commonly encountered. The bronze-toned dial harmonizes beautifully with the warmth of the case, while its original guarantee, dated 21st October 1958 and stamped by Rudolph Hübner in Vienna, alongside its accessories, completes an offering of rare coherence. The Rolex reference 3529 stands among the most intellectually intriguing and visually distinctive creations of early Rolex production, an exploration of geometry, rarity, and technical ambition condensed into one of the smallest and most complex wristwatches of its time. Introduced in 1938, at a moment when wristwatches were still defining their identity, the reference 3529 broke conventions by combining a square, water resistant, case with a chrono-

graph function, an achievement that remains remarkable even by today's standards. Produced only until approximately 1942, and in extremely limited numbers, it is estimated that just 62 examples were manufactured across all metals, placing it among the rarest vintage Rolex chronographs known. Its design is a study in contrasts. The strict geometry of the square case frames a richly detailed dial featuring a circular tachymeter scale, creating a compelling interplay between form and function. The silvered surface, enhanced by blue printed scales, Roman numerals, and subsidiary dials, reflects the refined complexity typical of high-grade chronographs from the period. Equally notable is the case, whose proportions and construction exemplify Rolex's early innovations in waterproof design. The presence of well-preserved engravings, including the reference and logo, speaks to the watch's careful preservation over time. Today, the reference 3529 stands not only as a highly collectible chronograph, but as a landmark piece, one that captures a moment of creative audacity and remains, without exaggeration, among the most fascinating and important early Rolex wristwatches ever produced.

An exceptional example of Rolex's bold and unconventional design from the 1960s, the King Midas reference 9630 is immediately recognizable for its asymmetrical, sculptural case and avant-garde lines, a striking departure from traditional Rolex aesthetics. Commissioned in the early 1960s and designed by Gérald Genta, years before his iconic Royal Oak and Nautilus, the watch drew inspiration from the architecture of the Greek Parthenon, revealing Genta's artistic approach and lasting influence on mod-

ern watch design. Introduced in 1962 and produced until approximately 1972, this reference represents the very first King Midas series which notably does not bear the "Cellini" signature on the dial, distinguishing it from later iterations. This particular example, No. 003, is crafted in yellow gold and belongs to the earliest production of the reference. According to scholarship, fewer than 800 examples of the reference 9630 were produced across all metals. Among these, only the first 250 pieces, including this watch, were manufactured without the "King Midas" engraving on the side of the case, making them exceptionally rare and highly sought after by collectors. The dial is equally distinctive, featuring the unusual placement of the "Swiss" signature at 12 o'clock beneath the Rolex logo, rather than the conventional 6 o'clock position. This layout corresponds exactly to the dial design shown in Rolex advertisements, further confirming the watch's early production status and enhancing its historical significance within the King Midas series. A remarkable combination of pioneering design, historical importance, limited production, and distinctive dial configuration, this King Midas reference 9630 No. 003 represents a highly desirable opportunity for collectors of Rolex's most sculptural and iconic creations.

The Rolex reference 16014 is, in essence, a familiar silhouette. Oyster case, fluted bezel, automatic movement, nothing here seeks to surprise. And yet, the moment the eye meets the dial, the narrative shifts entirely. The later added malachite surface, with its hypnotic green striations, feels almost alive. It is not decoration in the traditional sense, but rather a slice of natural artistry, shaped by time long before it ever found its way into a

watchmaker's hands. What is particularly compelling is the tension between the strict geometry of the case and the organic fluidity of the dial. Rolex, known for discipline and precision, allows nature to take the lead here, and the result is quietly spectacular. These dials were never straightforward to produce, and many were lost in the process, making surviving examples all the more intriguing today. Then there is the added layer of ownership. Having once belonged to Romeo Sarfati, recognizable to a generation of viewers through French television, this watch carries with it a trace of personality, of presence. Not loudly stated, but undeniably there. And perhaps that is the essence of this piece. It does not compete, it does not shout. Instead, it offers something subtler: individuality within a framework of restraint. A Datejust, yes, but one that gently steps outside the expected, and in doing so, becomes far more memorable.

At its core, the reference 16000 is a study in restraint: steel case, smooth bezel, the familiar architecture that has defined the model for decades. Yet, here, it quietly departs from convention. The later added dial, fashioned from tiger's eye, introduces an entirely different dimension. Its striated bands of caramel and deep espresso shift with the light, offering a sense of movement even when the watch rests still. No two are ever alike, and that alone elevates

it beyond the ordinary. Stone dials, by their very nature, were never easy to produce. Fragile, unpredictable, and often unforgiving, they resulted in far fewer surviving examples than standard counterparts. Those that endure, occupy a discreet but important place in the Rolex universe. Adding a further layer of intrigue, this particular piece carries a trace of personal history, having once belonged to French actor Romeo Sarfati. While subtle, such provenance lends the watch an added narrative, one that extends beyond manufacture and into lived experience. Mechanically, it remains everything one expects: dependable, precise, and effortlessly wearable. But this is not a watch that relies on mechanics alone. Its appeal lies in nuance, in texture, in the quiet interplay between material and light. It is, ultimately, a Datejust for the seasoned eye, one that does not ask for attention, but invariably earns it.

Within Cartier's century-long exploration of geometry, proportion, and mechanical ingenuity, the Tank Basculante occupies a rare and compelling niche, a design that bridges the Maison's Art Deco lineage with a highly inventive mechanical twist. First conceived in the early 1930s in response to the era's emerging fascination with reversible timepieces, most famously embodied by the Jaeger-LeCoultre Reverso, Cartier's Basculante introduced its own take on the cabriolet concept, allowing the wearer to flip or tilt the case to protect the dial or reveal the caseback, transforming a simple wristwatch into

a playful and tactile object of enduring interest. The reference 2522, produced around the late 1990s and early 2000s, revives this historic mechanism in a contemporary stainless steel execution, celebrating both Cartier's heritage and its willingness to innovate within a classic framework. Instead of horizontal rotation like the Reverso, the Basculante's case pivots vertically, a refinement of the reversible idea that feels uniquely Cartier in spirit and ingenuity. The present example's stainless steel construction underscores the model's versatility, at once robust and impeccably finished. Its elongated rectangular proportions echo the Tank family's lineage, yet the Basculante's mechanical personality gives it a presence all its own. The dial is classic Cartier: crisp Roman numerals, elegantly shaped blued steel hands, and a secondary small seconds indication that adds both functionality and visual balance to the composition. Today, the Tank Basculante reference 2522 is admired by collectors not for ubiquity, but for character: a watch that seamlessly marries Cartier's storied Art Deco heritage with a playful, mechanical flourish rarely seen outside of specialized complications. It is a piece that invites engagement, rewards curiosity, and stands as a testament to Cartier's ability to reinvent tradition without forsaking elegance

Emerging from one of Patek Philippe's most creatively fertile periods, the reference 2471 perfectly illustrates the maison's bold experimentation with form in the mid-20th century. At a time when shaped watches were not

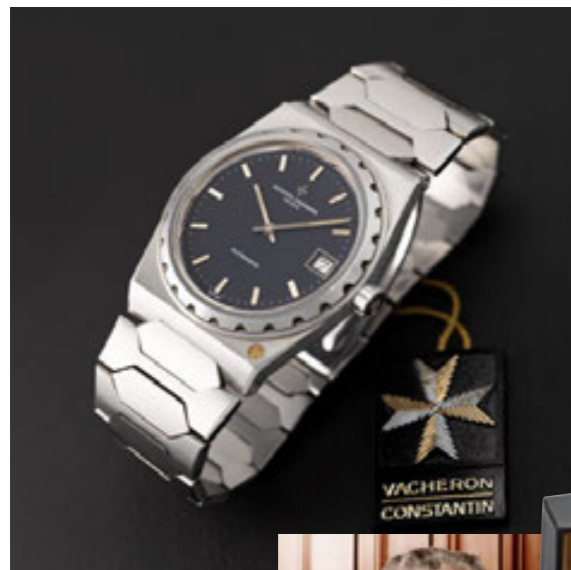

At a time when leading manufactures were redefining elegance through steel and integrated forms, Vacheron Constantin introduced a model that balanced technical sophistication with understated individuality. Unveiled in 1977 to celebrate the maison's 222nd anniversary, the

reference was conceived by a young Jörg Hysek, whose approach resulted in a distinctive yet harmonious aesthetic. The tonneau-shaped case flows seamlessly into an integrated bracelet composed of faceted links, while the fluted bezel lends subtle character without excess. A small Maltese cross set into the case side provides a discreet signature, reinforcing the brand's identity in an otherwise minimalist composition. Inside, the watch is powered by the ultra-thin automatic calibre 1121, admired for its elegant construction and reliability. Its slim profile allows the watch to retain a refined presence on the wrist, combining comfort with mechanical pedigree. Produced for a limited period, the model remains relatively scarce today. This particular example is especially attractive, featuring a dial with luminous markers that enhance its vintage appeal. Adding further historical intrigue, the caseback is engraved “M.R. Pahlavi” and dated 1980, referring to Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, the last Shah of Persia. The presence of this signature strongly suggests that the watch may have originally been presented as a personal gift or commemorative piece. The 1980 inscription carries additional poignancy, as it marks the year of the Shah's passing, further enriching the narrative and collectability of the watch. Unfortunately, no known photographs currently exist depicting the Shah wearing this particular watch, most likely because it was gifted to him relatively late in his life. Nevertheless, the model aligns perfectly with his well-documented taste for elegant yet discreetly luxurious timepieces, making its association with him especially credible and compelling.

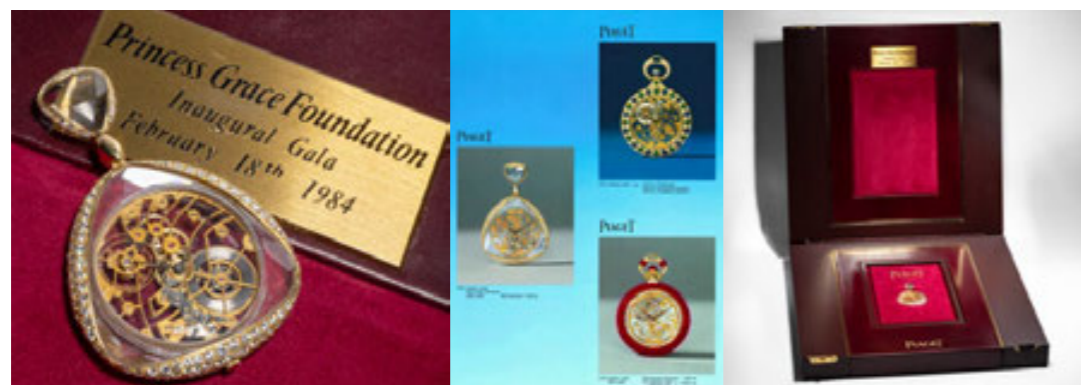

In the late 1970s, as quartz technology rapidly reshaped the watch industry, Audemars Piguet adopted a characteristically measured response. Rather than applying

quartz to its most iconic models, the Manufacture chose to explore a parallel path, one that could embrace innovation while preserving its design integrity. Under the direction of Jacques-Louis Audemars and Georges Golay, this approach led to the introduction of the reference 6005 in 1978, designed by Jacqueline Dimier. While clearly inspired by the Royal Oak, the 6005 establishes its own identity through a distinct case architecture. The lines are softer and more rectilinear, with beveled edges creating a smoother, more continuous profile. Within Universal Genève's celebrated chronograph lineage, few pieces command attention quite like this imposing UG reference 22430. While the Compax family is already synonymous with refined mid-century chronographs, this example pushes the boundaries of the genre, both in scale and presence. Dating to the mid-1940s, its most striking feature is undoubtedly the case size. At approximately 45 mm, it stands as an outlier in a period when chronographs

were typically far more restrained. Manufactured between approximately 1940 and 1968, the reference was produced in a total of just 740 examples, of which 405 were cased in yellow gold. A distinguished example of early 20th-century watchmaking, this Vacheron Constantin pocket watch reflects both technical ambition and refined execution. At the time of its creation, such watches were conceived not as lifestyle objects, but as working instruments, designed for engineers, military personnel, and technicians who relied on

precise elapsed-time measurement in their daily activities. This purpose-driven approach is immediately visible on the dial. Far from minimal, it presents a richly layered composition, combining tachymeter, telemeter and pulsation scales within a two-tone layout that enhances both legibility and functionality. The result is a dial that feels almost architectural in its construction, complex, yet entirely coherent, with every element serving a clear role. The case follows the same logic. Built in the classic three-part configuration with a snap back, it reflects the robust construction typical of the 1930s and 1940s. The lugs, with their pronounced bevels, retain strong definition, an increasingly rare trait, while the 37mm diameter stands out as notably large for the period, reinforcing its professional intent and improving readability. Powering the watch is the revered calibre 33.3 CH, widely regarded as one of Omega's finest chronograph movements. Its technical quality and historical importance place it among the great calibres of its time. Preserved in excellent overall condition and accompanied by an Extract from the Archives confirming production in 1943, this watch embodies the essence of early chronograph design, functional, refined, and deeply rooted in its historical context.

Few creations in Rolex history achieve the level of singularity embodied by reference 1831. Conceived during the 1970s, this extraordinary model stands apart not only within the Day-Date family but across the entire production of the brand, representing a rare moment where

ambition clearly outweighed industrial logic. Unlike virtually all other Rolex watches, this reference was not designed with standardization in mind. Instead, it was conceived as an object of prestige, with nearly every element developed specifically for it. Research suggests that only nine pieces were ever made, all in platinum, and widely believed to have been intended for the Shah of Iran, a patron known for his taste for exceptional and highly exclusive commissions. The watch impresses immediately through its sheer physical presence. With a weight approaching 300 grams, it is defined by a bold case paired with a bracelet of substantial, satin-finished links, an architecture never revisited in later Day-Date models. Its design language recalls the strong, sculptural forms associated with Gérald Genta's era, reinforcing its unconventional identity. Equally distinctive is the dial. While its deep burgundy tone evokes Stella lacquer dials, its layout is entirely special, with large diamond-set markers positioned along the outer minute track, creating a striking sense of scale and visual tension. In the realm of Rolex collecting, certain references transcend rarity to reach legendary status. The 1831 firmly belongs to this category. The present example, numbered “2” on the caseback, represents an exceptionally rare opportunity to acquire a watch that can truly be considered among the ultimate expressions of the Day-Date.

The present Tank Normale represents one of the finest post-war examples from Cartier's London workshop, a series of watches highly sought after for their precise proportions, exceptional finishing, and restrained elegance. Following the revival of A. Lange & Söhne in 1994, the Lange 1 quickly became the emblem of the manufacture's new era, introduced alongside three other inaugural models. Its innovative design—defined by an asymmetric yet perfectly balanced dial—features an off-centre time dis-

play, subsidiary seconds, power reserve indicator and the signature oversized date, elements that have been reinterpreted through numerous variations over the years. The present example, reference 101.035, represents one of the most distinctive and sought-after executions of the model. Housed in a 38.5mm platinum case, it is characterized by its striking black dial with matching black date discs and contrasting white graphics, a bold monochromatic configuration that has earned it the nickname "Darth" among collectors. The watch is powered by the manually wound calibre L901.0, showcasing the traditional hallmarks of the manufacture, including German silver plates, screwed gold chatons and a hand-engraved balance cock. Beyond the Daytona, Rolex produced a number of chronograph models from the 1930s onward that significantly shaped the evolution of the wrist chronograph. The earliest generations were housed in non-Oyster cases and encompassed a wide range of references, among which the reference 2508 stands out as one of the most iconic. Introduced in the late 1930s and produced until the mid-1940s, the reference was manufactured in several configurations despite its relatively short production span. It can broadly

be divided into two case types: a first series featuring a larger case with so-called "olive" pushers, and a second series such as the present example, with a smaller case and square pushers. Both case types were manufactured by Favre Perret, a casemaker based in La Chaux de Fonds, as evidenced by the hammer-head stamp bearing the number 115, identifying the casemaker. Conceived as a functional tool watch, the model was most commonly fitted with telemeter or tachymeter scales and powered by the renowned Valjoux 22 calibre, a manual winding movement celebrated for its reliability and precise timekeeping. While the majority of examples were produced in stainless steel, the present watch, cased in pink gold and further distinguished by its matching pink dial bears the "antimagnetic" designation, and the handset is entirely composed of blued steel, represents a particularly rare and attractive configuration. Furthermore, the exterior of the caseback still displays a clearly visible Rolex coronet, reference and case numbers, remarkably well preserved considering the age of the watch.

The Cartier Tank Allongée represents one of the most elegant evolutions of the Tank family, distinguished by its elongated proportions and refined linearity. Produced at the Cartier Paris boutique, the model reflects the Maison's continued exploration of the rectangular form, emphasizing verticality and balance while preserving the timeless codes established by the original Tank. The present exam-

ple is crafted in yellow gold and fitted with a particularly attractive dial signed "Cartier France." It features classic Roman numerals, chemin de fer minute track, and blued steel hands, all arranged within a composition of remarkable restraint. The sapphire cabochon set into the winding crown provides a subtle yet unmistakable signature of the Maison. Notably, the case construction differs from the more commonly encountered Tank executions. Rather than the traditional four screws securing the brancards, this watch features a snap-on case back. The case bears London import hallmarks and is signed with the old JC hallmark (Jacques Théodule Cartier), highlighting its provenance and the Maison's practice of marking pieces for export while maintaining Parisian manufacture. The watch is powered by a European Watch & Clock Co. movement, frequently used by Cartier during the period, reflecting the collaborative manufacturing practices typical of the Maison's Paris workshops. Elegant, uncommon, and visually striking, this Tank Allongée embodies the understated sophistication of Cartier design, where refined proportions and subtle variations in construction elevate an already iconic form into something distinctly rare.

A remarkable testament to early 20th-century watch-making, the here offered Patek Philippe pocket watch brings together two of the most sophisticated complications of its time within a single, finely executed piece. Crafted in platinum and bearing the prestigious Tiffany & Co. signature, it reflects a collaboration reserved for only

the most distinguished creations. The dial immediately conveys refinement, with applied Breguet numerals and a well-balanced arrangement of registers that ensure both clarity and elegance. Its restrained aesthetic conceals a high level of mechanical ingenuity, revealing itself only upon closer inspection. At its core lies a split-seconds chronograph, a complication designed to measure simultaneous intervals, an achievement that required exceptional technical mastery and was produced in very limited quantities. Complementing this is a minute repeater, allowing the watch to audibly indicate the time with a clear and harmonious chime, a feature prized for both its practicality and its artistry. The enduring performance of these mechanisms, still functioning with precision and musicality, speaks volumes about the expertise of Patek Philippe's watchmakers. Combined with its overall state of preservation, this piece stands as a compelling example of the brand's pursuit of excellence. Blending rarity, mechanical sophistication, and timeless design, this pocket watch represents a significant and highly desirable addition to any serious collection.

Among the many shaped wristwatches produced by Patek Philippe in the post-war years, the reference 2461 occupies a particularly distinctive position. Known to collectors as the “Tegola” in Italian circles, it represents a confident departure from classical rectangular forms, embracing a more sculptural and architectural lan-

guage. The present example showcases this design at its most compelling. Its elongated yellow gold case, creates a dynamic silhouette rarely encountered in mid-century watchmaking. The proportions, larger than its predecessor reference 425, give the watch a stronger wrist presence while maintaining remarkable refinement. Adding to its charm is the gently sloped crystal, which follows the contour of the case and enhances the visual fluidity of the piece. Equally appealing is the dial, whose soft silvered surface provides a restrained yet luminous backdrop to the applied markers and dauphine hands. Manufactured by the celebrated casemaker Markowski, identified by the poinçon de maître number 8, the case reflects a high level of craftsmanship, with crisp lines and well-preserved surfaces. His later collaborations on avant-garde designs make this earlier work all the more significant. Produced between the early 1950s and mid-1960s in a variety of metals, the reference 2461 remains one of Patek Philippe's most elegant shaped watches, an object where design, proportion and rarity converge with quiet authority.

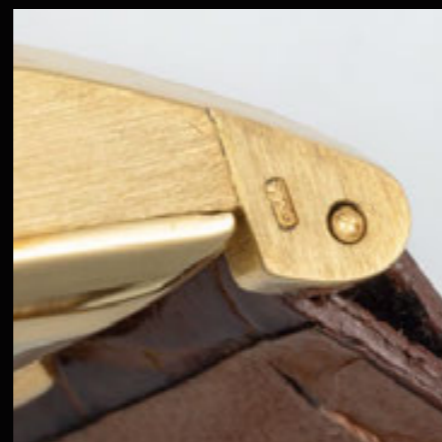

At the dawn of the twentieth century, wristwatches were still a daring proposition. Pocket watches reigned supreme, and only a handful of visionary manufactures understood that the future would be worn on the wrist. Among them, Patek Philippe stood apart. Its early wristwatches

were not adaptations but carefully considered creations—often produced in minute quantities, shaped with elegance, and finished to the same uncompromising standards as their grand complications. These were objects made for connoisseurs long before the word “collector” entered the horological vocabulary. The present 18K yellow gold tonneau-shaped wristwatch, manufactured in 1913 and sold in 1919, belongs to that pioneering era. Its softly faceted case, with gently curved flanks and articulated lugs, reflects the transition from Art Nouveau fluidity to early Art Deco geometry. The gilted guilloché dial, framed by a finely detailed minute track and stylised numerals, possesses a quiet, almost poetic refinement. Time has lent it a gentle patina, enhancing rather than diminishing its charm. The blued hands float above the textured surface with remarkable delicacy, a reminder that restraint was once the ultimate luxury. Equally compelling is its state of preservation. The case retains strong definition and architecture, including the warm oxidation along the edges that speaks to more than a century of existence. The engraved caseback—bearing a personal dedication dated September 1919 adds a testament to its level of preservation and age.

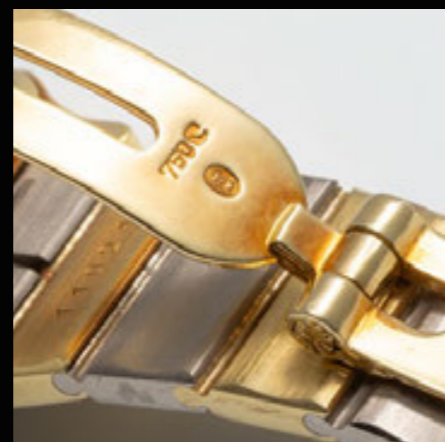

An object that challenges expectations at first glance, this Santos presents itself not merely as a watch, but as a deliberate reinterpretation of an icon. Rendered in a striking combination of yellow and white gold, the familiar geometry of the Santos is here softened and enriched through contrast and texture. The alternating links of the bracelet create a rhythmic interplay of tones,

while the integration of diamonds, subtly set within both bezel and bracelet, introduces a discreet brilliance that reveals itself gradually rather than immediately. What distinguishes this example is precisely that balance: it resists excess. The diamonds do not dominate; instead, they punctuate the design, echoing the industrial screws that have long defined the Santos aesthetic. The dial remains faithful to tradition, with its Roman numerals and blued hands offering a sense of continuity amid the more elaborate exterior. Beneath, an automatic movement ensures practicality, reinforcing the idea that this is still, fundamentally, a watch conceived for daily wear, albeit in a far more elevated form. Unusual in both execution and intent, this piece belongs to a category of Santos models that explored the boundaries between sport, jewelry, and design. Such examples were produced in limited quantities, often for a clientele seeking individuality rather than convention. It is, ultimately, a Santos reimagined: a watch where contrast becomes its defining language, and rarity lies not only in its scarcity, but in its quietly confident departure from the expected.

For much of its history, Audemars Piguet relied on collaborations with external designers, most notably Gérald Genta. However, in the early 1970s, under the direction of Georges Golay, the Manufacture made a decisive shift by bringing design in-house. In 1972, the young Jean-Fred

Meylan was recruited, marking one of the first instances of an internal designer shaping the aesthetic identity of an Audemars Piguet timepiece. The reference 6001 stands as a direct result of this transition, reflecting a new creative independence within the brand. At the same time, the Swiss watch industry was facing the rise of quartz technology. Rather than risk adapting its newly launched and already iconic Royal Oak into a quartz format, Audemars Piguet chose a more cautious and experimental approach. The result was the reference 6001, the brand's first quartz wristwatch, introduced in 1974. It was fitted with the Audemars Piguet calibre 2510, the first quartz calibre destined to power Audemars Piguet watches, and used in approximately 350 examples of the model between 1974 and 1978. Aesthetically, the reference 6001 reflects the bold and experimental spirit of the 1970s. The present example, in stainless steel, is characterized by its strong geometric case and substantial proportions, partly dictated by the dimensions of the quartz movement it houses. The dial features a tapisserie pattern, lending texture and depth to an otherwise minimalist and modern design, while maintaining a distinctly contemporary aesthetic inspired by the visual language of early electronic displays.

A creation that perfectly captures Patek Philippe's willingness to explore form beyond convention, the reference 2517 stands apart as one of the maison's most distinctive mid-century designs. Affectionately known among col-

lectors as the "Fisarmonica," its nickname derives from the sculptural, gadrooned lugs whose rhythmic repetition evokes the folds of an accordion. Produced only for a brief period during the 1950s, and in extremely limited numbers, the model remains a rarity even within the already exclusive world of shaped Patek Philippe watches. Yellow gold examples, such as the present watch, are believed to number only a small handful, with pink gold versions even more elusive. This scarcity, combined with its unconventional design, has elevated the reference to near-mythical status among seasoned collectors. The case is the undeniable focal point. Its strong rectangular form is softened by the undulating lugs, which create a sense of movement and depth rarely encountered in classic dress watches. Complementing this bold exterior is a refined dial, whose restrained layout provides balance to the expressive case. The subsidiary seconds register and applied markers maintain a sense of traditional watchmaking discipline, ensuring the piece remains elegant despite its avant-garde flair. Preserved with crisp definition to its case and harmonious proportions throughout, this reference 2517 represents a fascinating chapter in Patek Philippe's design history, where creativity, rarity, and craftsmanship converge in a truly memorable form.

The execution is precise and deliberate, transforming the watch into a piece that sits at the intersection of haute horlogerie and high jewelry, without compromising its sporty DNA. The presence of the Asprey signature further reinforces its exclusivity, a discreet yet powerful mark of bespoke craftsmanship. Among the most demanding expressions of haute horlogerie, hand-skeletonization stands at the pinnacle of both technical mastery and artistic craftsmanship. The present Audemars Piguet reference 5036, dating to the 1950s, is a rare and early example of this discipline applied to a wristwatch, where mechanical function is

transformed into visual art. Each component of the movement has been painstakingly opened by hand, removing all non-essential material while preserving perfect structural integrity. This extraordinarily delicate process requires absolute precision, as even the slightest excess removal would compromise timekeeping. The remaining bridges are then finely hand-engraved and finished, creating a dynamic interplay of light, depth and motion. The result is a fully exposed calibre that is not only functional, but sculptural. Arguably among the earliest Audemars Piguet wristwatches to feature a skeletonized dial, this reference holds an important place in the brand's history, showcasing a forward-thinking approach long before such designs became widely appreciated. The rectangular case is remarkably well-preserved, with sharp lines and minimal wear. The original enamelled Roman numerals on the bezel remain intact and crisp, elegantly framing the movement. Additionally, the deep hallmarks between the lugs at 12 o'clock further attest to the watch's authenticity and careful preservation. Reserved exclusively for precious metals since its introduction, the Day-Date became synonymous with authority, refinement, and technical excellence, and remains widely regarded as the brand's flagship classic. At first glance, this piece reveals nothing of its true purpose, only a fluid bracelet of white gold, richly adorned with diamonds, resting elegantly on the wrist. Time itself remains hidden, reserved for the wearer alone. It is only with a gentle motion that the secret unfolds. The hinged cover opens to reveal a finely proportioned dial, modest in size yet perfectly executed, a quiet reminder that beneath the jewel lies a true timekeeper. This interplay between concealment and revelation is precisely what defines Rolex's jewel-

ery watches of the mid-20th century. Unlike their sport counterparts, these creations were never about standardisation. Each was conceived as an object of personal luxury, often produced in very limited numbers and sometimes retailed through prestigious jewellers. Rolex worked closely with specialised workshops, combining its technical expertise with the savoir-faire of master gem-setters. The result: pieces that feel less like products, and more like individual compositions. The bracelet itself deserves particular attention. Its supple, almost fabric-like construction allows it to drape naturally, while the diamonds, carefully selected and set, add brilliance without excess. Everything is considered, balanced, and restrained. Inside, a manual movement ensures reliability and precision, reinforcing the idea that even the most decorative Rolex never abandons its horological integrity. Today, such watches occupy a quietly important place in the brand's history. They speak of an era when elegance was intimate, when time could be kept privately, and when a watch did not need to announce itself to be truly exceptional.

The present Tank Cintrée represents an exceptionally rare special order piece, produced in platinum during the mid 2000s. 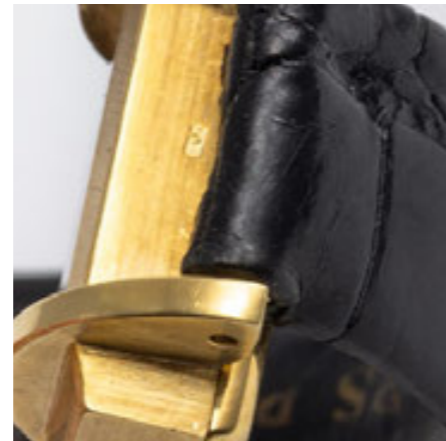

In 1932, as markets collapsed and confidence evaporated, Patek Philippe responded not with extravagance but with purity. The reference 96 was never conceived as a statement piece; it became one precisely because it refused to shout.

The Calatrava distilled the maison's philosophy into its most disciplined form: a perfectly judged round case, slender bezel and elongated lugs flowing downward with architectural precision. No excess, no theatrical complication, only balance, proportion and restraint. Over its long production life, the 96 evolved in whispers rather than revolutions. Subsidiary seconds gave way to center seconds, hands and signatures changed subtly, and each nuance became part of the broader narrative of 20th-century horology. The present example belongs to a particularly compelling chapter. Delivered in 1939, it was fitted from birth with a black dial, an uncommon and highly coveted configuration at a time when lighter tones dominated. Against the warmth of the yellow gold case, the dark surface creates a striking chiaroscuro. Look closer and another layer emerges. Faint, discreet and almost spectral, the retailer signature of Eberhard Milano once gleamed in gilt across the dial. Time has softened its presence, but not its importance. When such signatures survive, even as ghosts, they transform an already desirable reference into something far more nuanced and scholarly. Crucially, the Extract from the Archives confirms what the eye hopes: the black dial is original to the watch. In the world of early Calatravas, that single line carries enormous weight.

Among the most extraordinary and potentially unique configurations ever observed on a Rolex GMT-Master reference 6542, the present watch represents a discovery of remarkable importance, one that redefines the boundaries of what is known within early GMT-Master production. Introduced in 1954 at the request of Pan American World Airways, the GMT-Master was conceived as a professional instrument for pilots navigating multiple time zones during the

The glossy black surface displays an exceptional and possibly unique configuration: the absence of the “GMT-Master” designation, replaced instead by “Chronometer” and “Automatic,” combined with the highly coveted retailer signature “Tiffany & Co.” This unprecedented combination, never recorded in known literature or market appearances, positions the present example at the very forefront of Rolex scholarship. The Bakelite bezel retains vivid and attractive coloration, while the case shows strong proportions and well-preserved bevels, hallmarks of careful preservation and originality. Originally conceived as a tool for a select group of Pan Am pilots, this reference 6542 has transcended its utilitarian origins. The Rolex reference 16550 is often described as a transitional model, but that definition barely does it justice. Produced for only a few years in the mid-1980s, it represents the moment when the Explorer II model stepped out of its purely utilitarian roots and into a more technically advanced era. It introduced the sapphire crystal to the line and, more importantly, the caliber 3085 with independently adjustable 24-hour hand, transforming

the watch into a practical dual-time companion rather than simply a fixed 24-hour display. The example offered here dates to the beginning of that production run and belongs to a small, much-discussed group among collectors. Its dial, originally bright white, has developed over time into a warm ivory tone due to an early paint formulation that aged unpredictably. This was never an intended effect, and Rolex quickly corrected the issue. As a result, surviving examples with this creamy hue are not only attractive but historically specific to a narrow window of production. Each one evolves differently; no two are identical. Adding further interest is the so-called "rail" configuration, where the dial text above 6 o'clock aligns in a straight vertical line, an aesthetic detail appreciated by seasoned collectors. The tritium signature at the bottom of the dial confirms the period-correct luminous material, completing a combination that defines the earliest 16550s. Preserved in very good overall condition, this watch captures a short-lived configuration within a short-lived reference. For those who appreciate the nuances of Rolex evolution, early 16550s with ivory rail dials stand apart, not because they were planned that way, but because history made them so.

Gérald Genta is widely regarded as one of the most visionary figures in watchmaking, known for combining artistic creativity with extreme mechanical sophistication. Through his eponymous brand, founded in 1969, he moved beyond pure design, creating highly complicated timepieces often produced in limited or unique executions.

Within this universe of high horology, minute repeaters held a special place. Genta approached them not only as technical achievements, but as objects of emotion, watches capable of transforming time into sound, uniting craftsmanship, acoustics, and aesthetics. The present reference G.4036, produced in circa 1990, represents one of the most extreme expressions of this philosophy. Conceived as a unique piece, it embodies both rarity and virtuosity. The 36mm platinum case is enhanced by a bezel set with two rows of baguette-cut diamonds, creating a strong architectural presence. The mother-of-pearl dial introduces an iridescent depth, reflecting light with subtle variations and reinforcing the watch's refined yet highly decorative character. At its core lies a minute repeating movement, one of the most prestigious complications in watchmaking. The combination of this acoustic complexity with such an opulent execution is quintessentially Genta: a balance between technical mastery and artistic expression. More than a watch, this G.4036 stands as a true one-off creation, a rare testament to Gérald Genta's ability to push the boundaries of both design and horology.

The dial, understated and harmonious, features a delicate linen-like texture set with diamond hour markers, offering a restrained contrast to the more expressive exterior. The result is a balanced composition: decorative yet never excessive, luxurious yet discreet. 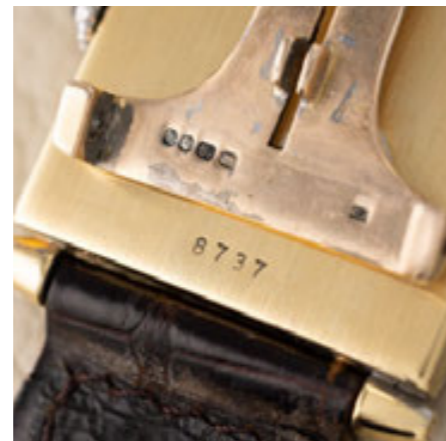

A refined and characterful example of the London-made Tank Obus, preserved with a warm aesthetic and desirable matching numbers to the clasp. The model, introduced in the early 1920s, takes its name from the French word *obus*, meaning artillery shell, referring to the distinctive rounded, protruding lugs that evoke the silhouette of shell casings. This sculptural interpretation represents one of Cartier's more expressive evolutions of the Tank family,

departing from the strict linearity of the original design while maintaining its architectural elegance. The present watch was manufactured in London and bears the characteristic internal caseback hallmarks associated with Cartier's London boutique, like the "JC" maker's mark. The date letter "O" further places production to approximately 1969, during a period when London-made Cartier watches were produced in small numbers and often display subtle variations in dial and case execution. It features classic Roman numerals arranged along the periphery, notably without a *chemin de fer* minute track, enhancing the purity and minimalism of the display. The overall aesthetic is elegant and restrained, with the warm dial coloration complementing the sculptural case form. The caseback numbers are repeated on the clasp, which also corresponds to both the external and internal caseback engravings, an appealing and increasingly rare detail that underscores the originality and coherence of the set. Altogether, this Tank Obus offers a compelling combination of historical significance, distinctive design, and period consistency, appealing to collectors of Cartier's most characterful mid-century productions.

A study in discreet complexity, this Cartier pocket watch exemplifies the maison's refined approach to high watch-making. While outwardly restrained, it conceals within a sophisticated split-seconds chronograph, one of the most technically demanding complications of its time. The dial immediately sets the tone. Executed with elegant arabic numerals and a balanced bi-register layout, it offers clarity

without sacrificing character. The scales are finely drawn, the proportions carefully judged, resulting in a display that feels both purposeful and harmonious. Encased in yellow gold, the watch has a reassuring presence in the hand, its rounded form and smooth surfaces emphasizing Cartier's preference for understated luxury. An unexpected and highly distinctive creation, this Rolex pocket watch departs from the brand's usual utilitarian aesthetic, embracing instead a more refined and decorative approach. The white gold case is both understated and luxurious, its

Among the most purpose-driven instruments ever adapted to the wrist, military split-seconds chronographs occupy a category of their own, built not for prestige, but for survival. This remarkable Universal Genève example stands as a direct witness to that era, conceived for aerial navigation when precision was not optional, but vital. Commissioned for the Italian Ministry of Defence and delivered through the historic Roman retailer A. Cairelli,

this timepiece was engineered for use in demanding flight conditions. Its large 44.5mm case immediately signals its utilitarian intent, offering exceptional legibility. The dial layout is both striking and highly functional: a rare 24-hour scale dominates the display, allowing pilots to distinguish day from night at a glance, while the oversized registers, including the distinctive 16-minute counter, were tailored for specific navigational calculations. Every detail reflects its military vocation. The bold Arabic numerals, deep blued hands, and clean sectorized layout ensure clarity under any circumstance. The presence of the Cairelli signature at six o'clock anchors the watch within a very specific historical and geographical context. Inside, the robust based Valjoux 55 rattrapante movement delivers the split-seconds function, a sophisticated complication allowing simultaneous timing of multiple events. This same architecture underpinned some of the most legendary chronographs ever produced, like the Rolex 4113, reinforcing the technical pedigree of the piece. Equally compelling is the engraved caseback, bearing official military specifications, an authentic mark of its operational life. Preserved in excellent condition, this watch secures a tangible connection to a time when precision instruments guided men through the unknown skies.

The Cartier Tank Louis represents one of the purest expressions of the Maison's timeless elegance. The Tank Louis was introduced in 1922 as an evolution of the original Cartier Tank created by Louis Cartier in 1917, reinterpreting its design with more elongated proportions, rounded brancards, and an even more refined and balanced aesthetic. Over the decades, it has become one of the most iconic and recognizable wristwatches ever produced, a true symbol of Cartier style. This example, produced by

Cartier London, belongs to the rare and highly sought-after English production of the early 1970s, today especially appreciated by collectors for its craftsmanship and the distinctive aesthetic details typical of the London maison. The Rolex reference 3265 is a seldom-seen model from the 1930s, produced in relatively small numbers and today appreciated for its understated yet distinctive character. Among the most elusive chapters in the Speedmaster narrative, this extraordinary prototype stands apart not only for its rarity, but for the very purpose behind its creation.

Unlike standard production pieces, this watch was never intended for commercial release. Its stainless steel case, manufactured in the United States to satisfy the stringent requirements of the Buy American Act, signals its direct link to NASA's operational framework. Produced in an extremely limited run, just ten examples, these watches were supplied in 1969 in connection with the Space Shuttle era, representing a fascinating bridge between experimental engineering and practical deployment. The dial is impressively remarkable. Distinguished by its unusual radial-register layout, it departs from the conventional Speedmaster aesthetic, offering a more technical, instrument-like display. The presence of a 0–60 calibrated bezel, of which only a handful are known, further underscores the experimental nature of the piece. Every element feels purposeful, designed with function in mind rather than commercial appeal. Engraved discreetly on the caseback, the marking "Not For Sale" serves as a quiet reminder of its intended destiny, never boutique windows, but mission briefings and controlled environments. Numbered 3 of 10, this example captures the essence of a moment when watchmaking intersected directly with the ambitions of space travel, resulting in an object that is as historically compelling as it is exceptionally rare.

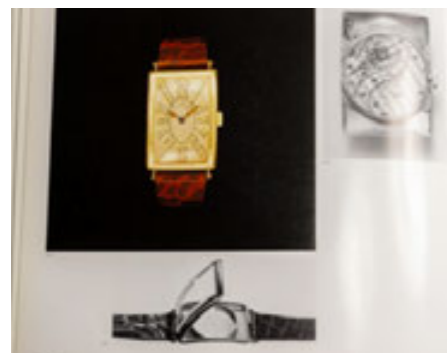

There is a particular magic to the earliest wristwatches produced by Patek Philippe, an era when the maison was still defining the very identity of the wristwatch. in an 18k yellow gold case, the watch stands out for its striking rectangular form and beautifully curved profile, designed to hug the wrist with surprising modernity. A Breguet Classique is never merely a watch; it is a conversation with the very origins of modern horology. The here offered Gübelin signed pocket watch represents the kind of horological achievement that rarely surfaces today, where technical ingenuity meets refined design in perfect equilibrium. The Gravity Equal Force holds a unique place in contemporary watchmaking as the world's first automatic wristwatch equipped with a true constant-force transmission. By regulating the energy delivered to the balance, the system ensures stable amplitude and consistent precision throughout the power reserve, an elegant and highly technical solution to one of mechanical horology's most persistent challenges. Beyond its technical significance, the watch distinguishes itself through a design language that places mechanics firmly at the centre. The black-finished mainplate is decorated with hand-executed guilloché by Kari Voutilainen, lending the movement a level of artisanal refinement rarely encountered in contemporary automatic watches and underscoring the haute-horlogerie ambition of the project. A first for the manufacture, the off-centre grey-toned sapphire dial serves as a discreet frame rather than a traditional dial, offering an unobstructed view of the constant-force mechanism. This transparency reflects the brand's long-standing philosophy of revealing, rather than concealing, the functional beauty of its movements. The visual identity is completed by striking orange accents: three coated brass bridges on the dial side, a matching balance bridge on the reverse, and hand-finished steel hands, all set against the dark movement architecture.

Following the acquisition of Blancpain in 1981 for the symbolic sum of CHF 21,500, Jean-Claude Biver, together with his partner Jacques Piguet, successfully revitalized the brand by focusing on high-end mechanical watchmaking and traditional craftsmanship. This vision led to the creation of six complicated mechanical wristwatches, each housed in elegant 34mm cases, now collectively referred to as the "Six Masterpieces." The present

watch, part of this landmark series, is a flying tourbillon reference 0023, introduced in 1989 as the final and most technically ambitious model of the collection. A refined expression of Cartier London's avant-garde creativity during the late 1960s and early 1970s, this Tank Allongée exemplifies the maison's pursuit of pure proportions and architectural elegance. Distinguished by its remarkably elongated silhouette, the present watch reinterprets the classic Tank form through a narrower and more extended yellow gold case, lending the design a striking linearity and understated sophistication. Most notably, the winding crown has been discreetly positioned on the reverse of the case, preserving the uninterrupted symmetry of the watch's profile. This unusual and high-

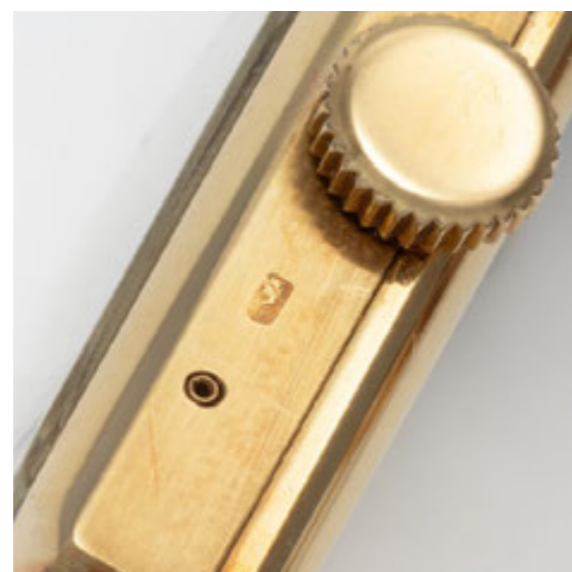

Some watches are rare. Others are important. And then there are those few that quietly sit at the intersection of both: pieces that, once understood, fundamentally reshape how one looks at a brand's history. This Audemars Piguet belongs firmly to that last category. Long before complicated wristwatches became a staple of modern collecting, Audemars Piguet was already experimenting with calendar indications in wrist format. These early efforts

were never about volume; they were about possibility. Produced in exceedingly small numbers, each example feels less like a model and more like a bespoke exercise in watchmaking. What immediately sets this watch apart is its architecture. The rectangular case, with its compact proportions and almost delicate lugs, gives it a distinctly refined presence on the wrist, far removed from the more familiar round designs of the period. The dial, is nothing less exceptional. At first glance, it appears complex, day, date, month, and lunar display all competing for attention. Yet, spend a moment with it, and a sense of calm order emerges. The indications are arranged with remarkable discipline, creating a composition that is informative without ever becoming overwhelming. The Cartier signature further enhances its intrigue, hinting at a collaboration between two of the most important names in watchmaking history. Production of such watches was extraordinarily limited, with only a handful believed to exist today. This is not rarity in the conventional sense: it is scarcity born of intention, from an era when such creations were reserved for a very select audience. For the seasoned collector, this is not simply another complicated watch. It is a statement piece, quiet, intellectual, and deeply significant.

At a time when round cases reigned supreme and conservatism was the lingua franca of fine horology, this square, architecturally assertive wristwatch emerged as a declaration of confidence. The geometry of this reference 3485 is deliberate, the lines taut, the proportions almost audacious for the late 1960s. The stepped case, executed here

in white gold, possesses a sculptural quality that rewards close inspection. The interplay between brushed planes and polished bevels gives the watch a quiet dynamism, almost Brutalist in spirit yet unmistakably Genevan in execution. Inside beats an automatic movement, underscoring the maison's technical maturity during the period. If rarity is measured not merely in numbers but in narrative, this example speaks volumes. Only four examples in white gold are known to scholarship, and among them, this is the sole piece retailed by Gobbi. The co-signature, crisp, hard enamel, and beautifully preserved, adds a layer of historical texture that transforms the watch from an object into a document. Gobbi, long established as one of Italy's most distinguished retailers, rarely appears on such unconventional Patek references. Condition, too, tells its own story. The hallmarks remain sharp and legible, the case edges well-defined, the surfaces honest. The dial retains its integrity, with the signature still proud and clear. An Extract from the Archives confirms production in 1967 and its sale on May 31st of the same year, placing this piece firmly within a fascinating transitional era, when design language across industries was evolving at speed. Reference 3485 is not a Calatrava, nor does it attempt to be. It is something rarer: a confident departure, executed with the quiet authority that only Patek Philippe could command.

Throughout its history, Patek Philippe has established itself as one of the foremost specialists in the production of minute repeating timepieces, a complication widely regarded as the pinnacle of traditional watchmaking. Since the 19th century, the Geneva manufacture has continuously refined the art of chiming watches, placing particular emphasis on the purity, clarity and richness of their sound, qualities that remain central to the Maison's philosophy. The present pocket watch, dating to the 1920s, is a refined and highly attractive example of

a minute repeater, housed in an elegant white gold case. The dial is distinguished by applied Breguet numerals, lending the watch a particularly graceful and classic appearance. Their sculptural form, combined with the clean layout and subsidiary seconds at six o'clock, enhances the overall balance and legibility of the timepiece. Of particular note is the solid caseback, personalized with a diamond-set initial "R," adding a distinctive and likely bespoke element to the watch, suggesting it was originally commissioned for a private client. A refined example of mid-20th century watchmaking, this elegant wristwatch embodies the understated sophistication associated with the Calatrava aesthetic. Crafted in yellow gold, the generously proportioned 38mm case is notable for its balanced architecture, enhanced by slender, straight lugs that lend the piece a timeless and modern presence on the wrist. The caseback reveals internally the poinçon de maître bearing the hammer head symbol alongside

Introduced by Cartier in 1932, the Basculante represents one of the maison's most inventive interpretations of the wristwatch during the interwar period. Conceived around a pivoting case mechanism, the model takes its name from the French verb *basculer*, to tilt or pivot, and was designed so that the dial could rotate face-down within its fixed outer frame, protecting the crystal and hands during travel or sporting activity. Unlike the sliding mechanism of the Jaeger-LeCoultre Reverso, the Basculante pivots elegantly on fixed lateral pins, demonstrating Cartier's own distinctive approach to protective watchmaking. The pres-

ent example is particularly notable for its highly desirable Paris-signed dial, an indication of production for Cartier Paris and a detail closely associated with the maison's most refined early creations from 13 rue de la Paix. The restrained elegance of the dial, with its Roman numerals, chemin de fer minute track and blued steel hands, perfectly encapsulates the sophisticated geometry that defined Cartier design during the Art Deco period. Further elevating the importance of this watch is its French made case bearing the "EJ" poinçon of Edmond Jaeger, the legendary horologist and supplier whose collaboration with Louis Cartier helped define early twentieth-century Cartier watchmaking. Jaeger was not merely a supplier, but one of Cartier's closest technical partners, responsible for some of the maison's most sophisticated wristwatch constructions and movements during the period. Rarely encountered in such historically coherent configuration, the present Tank Basculante embodies the spirit of Cartier's golden age: mechanically ingenious, architecturally pure, and unmistakably Parisian. More than a functional sports watch, it stands as a refined object of design, a compelling testament to Cartier's ability to merge utility, elegance and innovation into a singular horological form.

A rare and beautifully preserved yellow gold wristwatch, the present Cartier Tank Obus Savonette exemplifies Cartier's ingenuity in blending timeless design with technical refinement. A highly rare and historically compelling example of the early Datejust Ovettone, the present Rolex Datejust 6305-1 embodies the refinement and experimentation that defined Rolex production in the mid-1950s. Crafted in 18K yellow gold, it belongs to a short-lived and nuanced evolution of the celebrated reference 6305, distinguished by its bezel design. While the standard Rolex Datejust 6305 features a more tightly fluted bezel, the 6305-1 displays a broader, less densely cut fluting, anticipat-

ing the aesthetic language of later Datejust generations and lending the watch a subtly more modern appearance. The present example stands apart not only for its elegant proportions but, above all, for its remarkable state of preservation and its exceedingly rare dial configuration. The black dial, enhanced by gilt graphics and set with brilliant-cut diamond indexes, recalls the prestigious aesthetic codes found on reference 6062 models, combining technical sophistication with unmistakable visual richness. The warmth of the gilt graphics against the deep black ground, punctuated by the sparkle of diamonds, creates a dial of striking depth and character. To the best of our knowledge, only four examples of references 6305 and 6305-1 have appeared at public auction featuring this coveted black dial with diamond indexes in yellow or pink gold cases, including the present watch. Of these, two are configured with five diamond indexes and two with six. Cross-referencing with known black diamond-set dials on reference 6105 further suggests that the six-diamond configuration, such as the present example, is rarer, enhancing its desirability among discerning collectors. Previously offered at auction, this watch also boasts a distinguished and evocative provenance. It was formerly the property of Muhammad VIII al-Amin of the Husainid dynasty, the last Bey of Tunis and the only King of Tunisia. The watch was consigned for the previously sale in 2010 directly by a descendant of the family, further enriching its historical resonance.

The Patek Philippe reference 2442 Hour Glass belongs to a period when Patek Philippe explored form with remarkable freedom. Between the 1930s and 1950s, shaped watches were not exceptions but central to the brand's creativity, with rectangular and tonneau cases offering an alternative to the increasingly dominant round wristwatch. The reference 2442 stands out within this con-

text. Introduced in 1948, it features a distinctive “hour-glass” case, softly curved, with a natural flow that follows the wrist. Italian collectors later nicknamed it “Marilyn Monroe”, a fitting reference to its elegant, almost sculptural silhouette. Beyond its design, the technical aspect is equally important. The watch is powered by the rectangular caliber 9’’90, a movement specifically shaped to match the case. Such coherence between form and mechanics was never common and became increasingly rare as round calibers took over production in the following decades. Production of the reference remained limited, with fewer than 200 examples believed to have been made, the majority in yellow gold. The present pink gold version is therefore particularly uncommon and adds a layer of refinement to an already distinctive model. The dial maintains a balanced and classical layout, with applied Arabic numerals, faceted indexes, and a small seconds at six o'clock. Its restrained design contrasts nicely with the expressive case, creating a watch that is both decorative and wearable. Today, the reference 2442 represents a specific moment in Patek Philippe's history, when shaped watches combined technical consideration with aesthetic exploration. It remains one of the more elegant and less conventional expressions of mid-century watchmaking.

The Patek Philippe Nautilus reference 3700/11 stands at the intersection of two revolutions: one aesthetic, the other cultural. When Gérald Genta conceived the Nautilus in 1976, he did not merely design a watch, he challenged the very notion of luxury. The reference 3700,

the so-called “Jumbo,” is the purest expression of the Nautilus concept: monolithic, uncompromising, and resolutely modern. Within this lineage, the 3700/11 introduces a subtle yet powerful twist. The interplay of stainless steel and yellow gold transforms the watch from a design statement into a study in contrast. It is no longer purely industrial; it becomes quietly opulent. The case retains its iconic porthole construction, with its softly faceted bezel and lateral “ears,” evoking maritime strength. Yet here, the warm glow of gold softens the geometry, lending the piece a refined, almost architectural balance. The integrated bracelet, arguably one of Genta’s greatest achievements, continues this dialogue, alternating brushed steel with polished gold links in a rhythm that is both tactile and visual. The dial is equally compelling. Deep blue, horizontally embossed, it plays with light in a way that feels alive. The applied yellow gold indexes, punctuated by discreet sigma signatures, speak to an era when even the smallest details carried meaning, signifiers of precious metal, of discretion, of connoisseurship. What makes this watch so engaging is not rarity alone, though examples of the 3700/11 remain elusive. It is further offered with the Certificate of Origin dated 23rd January 1989 stamped by Herry Martin and invoice of service. Today, the Nautilus 3700/11 stands as one of the most nuanced interpretations of an icon, a watch that does not shout, but resonates deeply with those who understand.

The Van Cleef & Arpels Pierre Arpels Skeleton perfectly captures a moment in the 1980s when creativity in watchmaking moved beyond convention, blending high jewelry with mechanical expression. Conceived within the refined world of Van Cleef & Arpels and brought to life through the unmistakable vision of Gerald Genta, this piece stands

apart for its dual identity. Particularly appealing is the continuity of the design, extending to the diamond-set clasp, which reinforces the watch's jewelry-like character. The use of contrasting materials, precious stones, polished gold, and the dark strap, creates a refined balance between brilliance and structure. Preserved in very attractive condition, this automatic Pierre Arpels Skeleton represents a niche yet fascinating chapter of late 20th-century watchmaking, where maisons like Van Cleef & Arpels and Gerald Genta explored mechanical artistry through a distinctly decorative lens. It remains a compelling example of how craftsmanship and design can coexist in a piece that is both expressive and wearable.

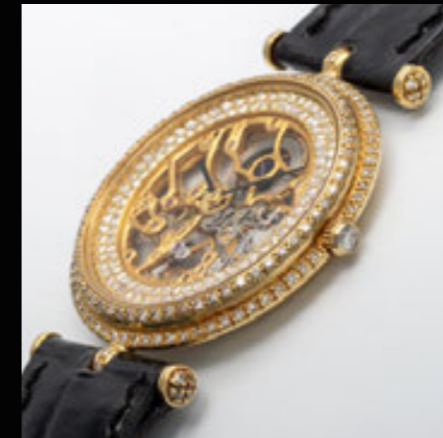

During the 1970s and 1980s, Gérald Genta, widely regarded as one of the most influential watch designers of the 20th century, engaged in a series of collaborations with prestigious maisons, including Van Cleef & Arpels. 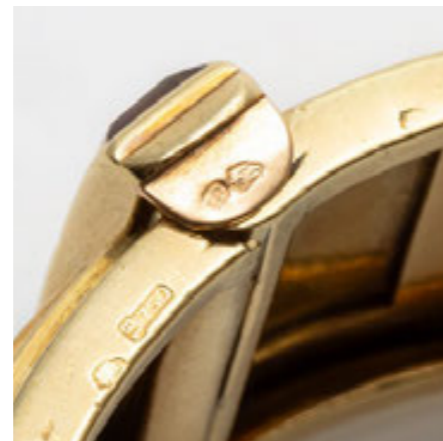
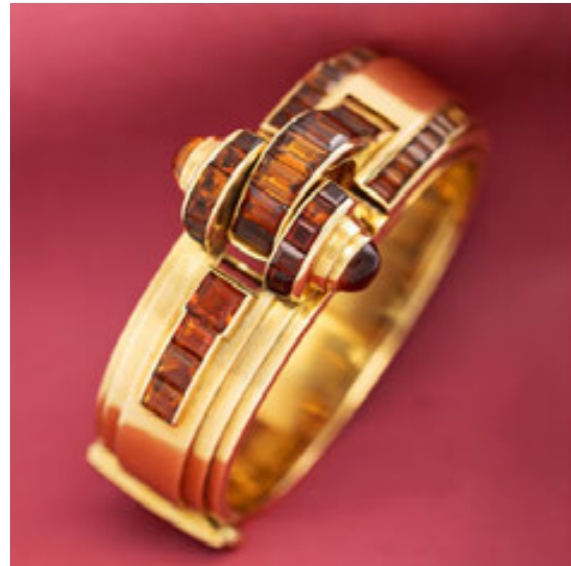

A striking testament to post-war creativity, this exceptional jewel-watch by Jaeger-LeCoultre embodies the refined audacity of early-century modernist design. Conceived as both ornament and instrument, the piece blurs the boundary between high jewellery and horology with remarkable sophistication. Crafted in 18k yellow gold and made in France, the bracelet is articulated as a sculptural com-

position of scrolling forms, punctuated by beautifully cut citrines whose warm, luminous tones range from honey to golden amber. Two cabochon citrines provide a subtle yet distinctive accent, enhancing the organic rhythm of the design. The reference 6098 belongs to that formative moment, when Rolex was refining what would eventually become one of its most enduring lines: the Explorer. Produced in the early 1950s, the 6098 is often associated with the era of great expeditions. Larger than many of its contemporaries, it introduced a more assertive case size and improved

legibility, features that would prove essential in extreme environments. It is within this context that the Explorer identity was taking shape, even before the name itself was fully standardized. Yet what truly sets this example apart is its dial. The so-called "honeycomb" texture gives the surface a remarkable depth, catching the light in a way that flat dials simply cannot. Over time, these dials age with tremendous character, developing warm tones that soften the originally stark contrast of black and gilt, yet here the quality of the black is impressively high. The configuration itself remains beautifully restrained: Arabic numerals at 3, 6, and 9, the iconic Explorer configuration, and the characteristic Mercedes hands, establishing a visual language that would later become iconic. This is not yet the Explorer as most know it. It is something earlier, more exploratory in spirit, a watch that captures Rolex at a moment of transition, where function, form, and identity were still being defined. And perhaps that is precisely why it resonates so strongly today.

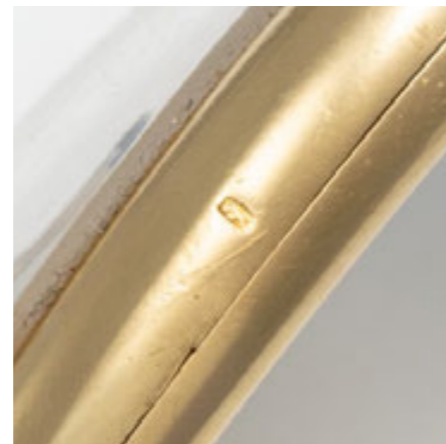

The watch here offered represents an exceptionally rare and early example of Audemars Piguet's wristwatch production during the 1920s, a period of remarkable creativity for the maison. To the best of our research, only one other comparable example have appeared for the moment in the auction market, underscoring its importance and

rarity. Its elongated tonneau-shaped case, crafted in yellow gold, reflects the refined elegance of the era, recalling the aesthetic language of Cartier and Patek Philippe, yet interpreted here with a distinct identity. Slightly curved, the case was conceived to follow the natural contour of the wrist, offering both visual harmony and comfort, an advanced consideration for its time. The dial is beautifully composed, with every element carefully adapted to the case's geometry. The Roman numerals are elongated and radially arranged, enhancing the sense of verticality, while the signature and indexes are positioned to maintain perfect balance. Particularly interesting is the minute track, which does not follow a simple oval but instead adopts a softly faceted, lozenge-like form, echoing the contours of the case and subtly guiding the eye along its elongated silhouette. The overall condition remains very pleasing, with the case retaining its original proportions and hallmarks still visible. Representative of one of Audemars Piguet's most fascinating periods, this watch is not only a rare survivor but also a refined expression of early wristwatch design, an opportunity that will undoubtedly appeal to the most discerning connoisseur.

Few names in horology evoke the idea of restrained elegance as consistently as Patek Philippe. The reference 3433 stands as a compelling expression of that philosophy: a watch that seamlessly balances technical innovation with refined aesthetics. Introduced in 1960, the reference 3433 succeeded the celebrated reference 2551 and represents an important stage in the evolution of Patek Philippe's self-winding wristwatches. While maintaining the harmonious proportions and timeless design

language of its predecessor, the 3433 was fitted with the manufacture's then-new caliber 27-460, a movement derived from the legendary 12-600AT and marking a significant advancement in reliability and performance. The case, measuring a generous 35 mm, is distinguished by its subtle yet architectural stepped profile. Its gently sloping bezel and flowing lines evoke the so-called "Disco Volante" aesthetic, lending the watch a dynamic yet understated presence on the wrist. The screw-down back further reinforces its practical, waterproof construction, a notable feature for an elegant dress watch of the early 1960s. The present example is further elevated by its rare and highly charismatic Pontie & Gennari "Lobster" bracelet in yellow gold. This sculptural bracelet design, with its articulated, ribbed central links, transforms the watch into a cohesive piece of mid-century design, enhancing both its visual identity and collectability. The origins of Pontie & Gennari further enrich its appeal: the Pontie family settled in Switzerland around 1850, where two brothers established a jewelry manufacture in Geneva. In the early 20th century, the Gennari family joined their cousins, leading to the company's renaming as Pontie Gennari. In 1946, the firm hired a young designer, Gerald Genta, whose influence is widely believed to have contributed to the brand's bold and sculptural creations. When his contract ended in 1950 he famously declared his independence reportedly throwing his tools into Lake Geneva and vowing never again to work for a "boss", a story that has since become part of the mythology surrounding the daring design language associated with the company.

A striking and unconventional creation from Rolex's mid-century production, the present "UFO" reference 9996, produced circa in 1964, stands as one of the brand's most elusive and sculptural designs. Defined by its smooth, disc-like silhouette, the model has earned its collector nickname "disco volante" for its unmistak-

able, almost extraterrestrial presence on the wrist. Rendered in yellow gold and measuring 36mm in diameter, the case is seamlessly integrated with a matching gold mesh bracelet, creating a continuous, fluid profile that enhances its futuristic aesthetic. The bezel is entirely smooth and unadorned, further emphasizing the purity of the form. The winding crown is discreetly incorporated into the case architecture, preserving the uninterrupted geometry of the design. Powering the watch is the manual-winding Rolex calibre 1210, a robust and refined movement typical of the period. The dial is equally restrained and elegant: a silver soleil surface devoid of numerals or markers, punctuated only by the applied Rolex crown at 12 o'clock and yellow gold indexes at 3, 6, and 9 o'clock. Dauphine hands complete the composition, reinforcing its balanced and minimalist character. A rare and little-known reference within the Rolex universe, the UFO 9996 embodies the brand's experimental spirit during the 1960s, when form and proportion were explored with remarkable freedom. Offered with its original Rolex presentation box and outer packaging, the present example represents a highly collectible and unusual expression of vintage Rolex design, appealing to connoisseurs of unconventional horology.

Few watches encapsulate Rolex's early technical ambition quite like the "Bubbleback," a model that, long before the era of dedicated tool watches, firmly established the brand's reputation for reliability and innovation. Introduced in the early 1930s, the Bubbleback, affectionately nicknamed "ovetto" by Italian collectors, owes its distinctive, rounded caseback to the integration of Rolex's pioneering automatic winding system. The present reference 5015 is a particularly appealing

expression of this lineage. Crafted in yellow gold, it combines the robustness of the Oyster case with a refined aesthetic that feels both purposeful and elegant. The bezel, with its finely machined finish, adds a subtle textural contrast, while the double baton at 12 o'clock, balanced by single batons for the remaining hours, introduces a pleasing visual hierarchy. The dial is especially attractive: a glossy black gilt surface with warm printing that has aged with remarkable charm. The baton indexes and the "Chronometer" designation at six o'clock reinforce the watch's technical credentials, while the overall composition remains clean, legible, and quietly sophisticated. Completing the ensemble is a yellow gold Oyster riveted bracelet, signed Mekan, whose construction further enhance the watch's appeal. In this configuration, the reference 5015 offers collectors not only an iconic form, but also a deeply satisfying blend of engineering significance and timeless design.

A striking and unconventional creation, the present, unique, Audemars Piguet reference 12620BC embodies one of the maison's most daring design explorations. Inspired by the historic reference 5167, it boldly adopts a triangular case, a radical departure from traditional watchmaking codes and a powerful statement of geometric experimentation. Its sharply defined angles and

clean, unadorned surfaces highlight a design language rooted in avant-garde aesthetics. The case architecture is both sculptural and purposeful, reflecting a pursuit of pure form where geometry becomes the defining element. This approach not only challenges classical norms but also anticipates later creations such as the [RE]MASTER02, where asymmetry and bold case construction are taken even further. The dial follows the same philosophy of restrained sophistication. Minimalist and highly legible, it emphasizes functionality through a clear layout and refined execution. The radial lines subtly animate the surface, creating depth while maintaining a disciplined and modern aesthetic. This balance between simplicity and visual impact is a direct evolution of the principles first explored with the reference 5167. The present example, crafted in white gold, was produced as a unique piece to celebrate the 125th anniversary of Audemars Piguet. Remarkably, this watch is further distinguished by its "pièce unique" engraving, echoing the individuality and experimental spirit of the original design. Accompanied by its Certificate of Origin, commemorative book, brochures, fitted presentation box and outer packaging, this watch stands as a unique and highly collectible testament to Audemars Piguet's willingness to redefine the boundaries of watch design, where heritage meets bold innovation in one of the brand's most distinctive forms.

A bold and highly individual creation, the present Hublot "Maradona" Split-Second Chronograph, crafted as a pièce unique, encapsulates the manufacture's disruptive philosophy and its deep-rooted connection to the world of football. Renowned for its "Art of Fusion", Hublot has consistently redefined contemporary watchmaking through unexpected material combinations and assertive design,

with its association with Diego Maradona further reinforcing its position within the sporting elite. While several limited editions were produced following the partnership in the early 2010s, the present watch stands apart as a singular execution, distinguished by both mechanical ambition and artistic individuality. The imposing case, executed in gold, features the brand's signature architectural construction, combining satin-brushed and polished surfaces with black composite elements, maintaining the powerful presence of the Big Bang lineage while conveying a more exclusive identity. The striking blue dial reveals a complex structure with applied gold-toned indexes and bold hands ensuring clarity and depth. The chronograph is enhanced by a split-second complication, allowing the measurement of intermediate times, while the oversized "10" at 6 o'clock pays tribute to Maradona's iconic jersey. The most remarkable element is found on the reverse, where the caseback is adorned with a hand-engraved medallion depicting a classical profile portrait reminiscent of Maradona, rendered in relief within the gold surface. This sculptural detail transforms the watch into a wearable work of art.

The Breguet Tradition reference 7057 is a clear expression of Breguet's ability to reinterpret its own history in a contemporary way. Rather than referencing the past through decoration alone, the Tradition line builds

directly on the architecture of Abraham-Louis Breguet's late 18th-century Souscription watches, where the mechanics themselves were the focal point. Introduced in 2010, the reference 7057 marks a more modern evolution of this concept. The larger 40mm case gives the watch greater presence, while the anthracite-treated movement enhances contrast and legibility. The entire gear train is displayed on the dial side, arranged with a strong sense of symmetry that reflects both technical logic and visual balance. The off-centered guilloché dial remains a defining feature. It preserves the classical Breguet language, Roman numerals, blued hands, engine-turned decoration, while allowing the movement to dominate the composition. The result is a layered display where tradition and mechanics coexist without compromise. The balance wheel, positioned prominently, becomes a natural focal point, while the power reserve indicator is integrated with restraint. Housed in white gold with a fluted caseband, the watch retains the familiar Breguet codes, yet feels distinctly modern in execution. The contrast between polished surfaces and the matte movement finish adds further depth.

Richard Lange, second son of founder Ferdinand Adolph Lange, was born on 17 December 1845, only days after the foundation of what would become Germany's most important watchmaking dynasty. Trained as a watchmaker from

an early age, he quickly distinguished himself for his technical aptitude and joined the family firm together with his brother Emil in 1871, when the company was renamed A. Lange & Söhne. During his years at the manufacture, numerous patents were secured and increasingly sophisticated timepieces were developed, including split-seconds chronographs and dead-beat seconds watches, with Richard Lange acting as the technical mastermind. Introduced in 2006, the Richard Lange collection pays tribute to this scientific legacy, embodying the pursuit of accuracy and clarity that defined its namesake. Conceived as a precision instrument rather than a purely decorative object, the line is characterised by balanced proportions, highly legible dials and mechanically refined movements. The present Richard Lange reference 232.021 is housed in a 40.5mm yellow gold case with a multi-layered white dial distinguished by its clean, regulator-inspired aesthetic with Roman numerals and yellow gold hands. Notably, the model features a central sweep seconds hand, a highly unusual characteristic within the A. Lange & Söhne catalogue, where subsidiary seconds displays are traditionally preferred. In fact, the Richard Lange time-only model is the only standard production Lange to feature central seconds.

Throughout the mid-20th century, particularly from the 1940s to the late 1960s, Audemars Piguet distinguished itself as a discreet yet highly accomplished producer of complicated wristwatches. Operating on an artisanal scale, the manufacture produced very few calendar wristwatches, with research indicating only 68 full calendar movements made between 1945 and 1960. Reference 5513 represents one of the most refined expressions of this production. Manufactured between 1951 and 1967 in just

19 examples across all metals, including only 11 in yellow gold, it ranks among the rarest complicated wristwatches produced by the Maison. The present example is of exceptional importance, bearing the prestigious Cartier signature on the dial. Archival research confirms that only two examples of reference 5513 were delivered to Cartier, the present watch being the first, supplied in May 1960. This rare double signed configuration places the watch within a highly exclusive category born from the collaboration of two of the most prestigious names in watchmaking and jewellery. The watch features a 31 mm yellow gold case with three correctors and displays a complete calendar with day, date, month and moon phases. It is powered by the calibre 9/10" RSQ, reflecting the refined construction typical of Audemars Piguet's mid-century production. Of particular note, the case bears French import hallmarks to the exterior of the caseback, alongside the mark "EJ", attributable to Edmond Jaeger. Inside, the key hallmark with maker's number 23 corresponds to the Geneva based casemaker Eggly & Cie, known to have supplied cases to leading manufactures, including Patek Philippe. The caseback is further engraved "Maman 19 Nov 62", adding a personal and historically charming dimension to the timepiece.

A refined and highly representative example of Patek Philippe's celebrated "stretched curved" series, the reference 492 perfectly embodies the elegance and technical sophistication of 1930s watchmaking. Produced between 1936 and 1947, alongside references 486, 490, 491 and 514, this model introduced a distinctive elongated and

curved aesthetic that would later inspire iconic creations such as the ref. 5101 and the limited ref. 5105P. The present watch features a beautifully proportioned two-piece case in yellow gold, measuring 23 x 43 mm. Manufactured by the renowned Geneva casemaker Staffelbach & Rotach (key number 15), the case displays the characteristic stepped "railway" profile, enhancing its architectural elegance and presence on the wrist. It is fitted with the calibre 9-90, a movement emblematic of Patek Philippe's precision during this period. The dial, produced by Stern Frères, is particularly noteworthy. While most examples are found with standard silvered finishes, this watch stands out for its highly attractive and rarely encountered two-tone configuration. The harmonious contrast, combined with applied numerals and a subsidiary seconds register, gives the watch a remarkable depth and character rarely seen on the market. With approximately 150 examples produced across all metals and only a limited number known today, including just 13 in yellow gold, the reference 492 remains an exceptionally rare model. The present watch, distinguished by its uncommon dial and elegant proportions, represents a true connoisseur's piece and a superb testament to Patek Philippe's timeless design language.

Among the most sculptural creations ever conceived by Patek Philippe, the reference 1593 stands as a bold departure from conventional watch design. Introduced in the mid-20th century, this model, often nicknamed "Hour Glass" for its distinctive silhouette, captures a moment

when the maison explored form with remarkable creativity, producing one of its earliest non-traditional shaped wristwatches. Its defining feature is the elegantly curved, flared case, where concave and convex lines interact to create a dynamic presence on the wrist. Crafted in platinum, the present example elevates this already rare design into a realm of true exclusivity. Production of the reference remained limited overall, with only a small portion executed in platinum, making such examples particularly coveted. The dial further enhances its refinement. Its silvered surface is adorned with a combination of brilliant and baguette-cut diamond markers, creating a subtle yet captivating interplay of light. The clean layout, complemented by slender hands and a subsidiary seconds register, preserves perfect legibility while emphasizing elegance. Powering the watch is the manually wound caliber 9-90, a movement specifically developed for shaped cases, reflecting Patek Philippe's commitment to technical harmony between mechanism and design. Adding another layer of desirability, this example bears the signature of Serpico y Laino, the prestigious Caracas retailer whose co-branded dials are among the most sought-after in vintage collecting. A rare combination of avant-garde design, noble materials and historical significance, reference 1593 remains one of the most charismatic and collectible shaped watches ever produced by Patek Philippe.

Introduced at the dawn of the jet age, the Rolex GMT-Master reference 1675 has long been regarded as one of the most emblematic tool watches of the 20th century. Conceived to answer the needs of intercontinental pilots, it distilled functionality, legibility, and robustness into a form that would ultimately transcend its utilitarian origins. Over decades of production, the reference evolved subtly, giving rise to countless dial, bezel, and configuration variants that today form one of the richest and most studied chap-

ters in vintage Rolex scholarship. The present example elevates the reference 1675 into an altogether different realm. What immediately distinguishes this watch is the vivid red signature of His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum placed discreetly in the lower half of the dial. This singular detail transforms an already iconic model into an object of extraordinary historical and political significance, placing it among a minute and highly coveted group of specially commissioned GMT-Masters. Born in 1949, Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum is today the Vice President and Prime Minister of the United Arab Emirates, as well as the Ruler of Dubai. Prior to ascending to these roles, he served as Minister of Defense, a period during which it is widely believed that Rolex watches bearing his signature were ordered directly from Rolex. These watches were not commercial products, but rather diplomatic gifts, bestowed upon high-ranking officials and distinguished foreign counterparts, imbued with both prestige and symbolism. Beyond the historical gravitas of the dial, the watch itself is preserved in remarkable condition, retaining the sharpness, balance, and visual coherence that collectors prize so highly in vintage Rolex. The convergence of an emblematic reference, impeccable preservation, and an unrepeatable provenance results in a watch that is not merely rare, but truly exceptional. For the seasoned collector, opportunities of this caliber are vanishingly scarce. This signed GMT-Master is not simply a variation within a reference—it is a testament to a specific moment in history, where horology, diplomacy, and power intersect, making it one of the most compelling vintage Rolex watches to appear on the market.

The Rolex Day-Date stands among the most iconic and historically significant models in watchmaking. Introduced in 1956 at the Basel Fair, it was immediately positioned at the top of the Rolex catalogue. Exclusively crafted in

precious metals, the Day-Date was conceived as the ultimate expression of elegance and prestige. At the same time, Rolex introduced a bracelet specifically designed for this model, now commonly referred to as the "President" bracelet. This designation became associated with the watch after the Maison presented a Day-Date fitted with this bracelet to U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The present example belongs to reference 18238, appreciated for the new caliber 3155, featuring the innovative double quickset function, allowing independent adjustment of both the day and the date. What truly sets this watch apart is its rare obsidian dial. Formed from natural volcanic glass, obsidian is prized for its deep gloss and unique patterns, creating a striking contrast with the yellow gold case and applied numerals. Further underscoring its importance, this exact watch is illustrated in Pucci Papaleo's book "DAY-DATE, The Presidential Rolex" (pp. 412-413). Preserved in excellent overall condition, it retains its original caseback sticker, a detail highly appreciated by collectors.

In 1996, Chopard entered a pivotal new phase with the launch of the L.U.C collection, named in tribute to its founder, Louis-Ulysse Chopard. With the establishment of its manufacture in Fleurier, the Maison reaffirmed its dedication to traditional Swiss watchmaking, introduc-

ing timepieces that combined refined in-house mechanical movements with elegant, classically inspired aesthetics. Reference 16/1860 belongs to this important first generation of L.U.C wristwatches and embodies the collection's original philosophy: timeless design, technical excellence and understated luxury. Produced in a limited series of 100 examples, the present watch is housed in a yellow gold case with softly curved lugs and a warm polished finish, offering a refined and balanced presence on the wrist. The dark dial is enhanced by an elegant guilloché centre, framed by applied yellow gold hour markers and slender dauphine hands, creating a composition of remarkable harmony and restraint. Of particular note is the hunter caseback, a hinged solid gold cover that opens to reveal the movement, adding both functionality and charm. The inner cover is engraved "25 May 2001" from A.& M. Scheufele to "Curt." — a detail of special significance given the Scheufele family's ownership of the Maison since 1963.

The Hublot King Power Maradona II feels like is carrying the aura of a legend himself. Produced in a limited series of 500 pieces, it represents one of the most striking intersections between high horology and modern sporting mythology. Housed in an imposing 48 mm matte black ceramic case, the watch fully embraces the architec-

tural, multi-layered construction that defines the King Power collection. The bezel, secured by Hublot's signature H-shaped screws, frames a dial that is anything but conventional. Openworked and dynamic, it reveals the mechanical heart beneath while boldly incorporating light blue accents, an unmistakable nod to Argentina's national colors. Rather than relying on subtle symbolism, this model makes its tribute explicit. Maradona's signature stretches confidently across the dial, while the chronograph layout remains powerful and balanced, with sub-registers positioned for immediate visual impact. The interplay between black, steel-grey mechanics and vivid blue details creates a dial that feels energetic much like the player it honors. At its core beats the automatic HUB4245 chronograph movement, operating at 4 Hz and offering a 42-hour power reserve. Robust, precise and designed for performance, it is perfectly aligned with the sporting DNA of the piece. Turning the watch over reveals yet another tribute: an engraved portrait of Maradona dominating the sapphire caseback, accompanied by the limited-edition engraving and individual numbering.

The Tudor Pelagos FXD Marine Nationale represents a modern continuation of one of Tudor's most credible legacies: its longstanding partnership with the French Navy. Since the 1950s, Tudor watches were issued to naval divers, valued for their robustness, legibility, and reliability under demanding conditions. With the FXD, Tudor revisits this heritage in a highly purposeful way. The name itself "Fixed" refers to the integrated strap bars, machined

directly from the titanium case. It is a simple but decisive feature, eliminating a point of failure and reinforcing the watch's utilitarian intent. The present example was developed in collaboration with the Commando Hubert, the elite combat swimmer unit of the Marine Nationale. As such, its specifications are not theoretical but operational. The bidirectional bezel, unusual for a diver's watch, is calibrated specifically for underwater navigation, a technique used by military divers rather than recreational ones. The 42mm titanium case offers both lightness and durability, while the matte navy-blue dial ensures excellent legibility. The square hour markers and "snowflake" hands, introduced by Tudor in 1969, remain among the most functional designs ever created for low-visibility environments. A discreet engraving on the caseback, "M.N.21," which stands for "Marine Nationale 2021" and the diver's assignment number (in this case 937) anchors the watch in its military context, echoing the markings found on historically issued pieces. What makes the Pelagos FXD particularly compelling is its clarity of purpose. It is not a reinterpretation for style, but a tool refined for use with still its full set of accessories. In doing so, it stands apart from many contemporary dive watches, offering a rare combination of authenticity, technical relevance, and modern execution.

A rare and highly charismatic interpretation of Patek Philippe's most emblematic dress watch, the reference 2508 in yellow gold occupies a distinguished place within the Calatrava lineage. Produced from approximately 1950 until the mid-1960s, the model is notable for its generously proportioned 35 mm case, an imposing presence for its time, perfectly balancing mid-century elegance with a modern sense of scale. The case, of waterproof construction, was manufactured by the renowned François Borgel (Taubert & Fils), the same celebrated casemaker responsible for such iconic references as the Calatrava 565

and the chronograph reference 1463 "Tasti Tondi." The caseback bears the FB hallmark alongside the Poinçon de Maître number 11, attesting to its prestigious origin. It retains its inner dust cover, and, consistent with early examples of the reference, features the cross beneath the "Patent" engraving, later iterations would display only the "Vacuum" designation. The flat, oversized crown, supplied by the esteemed Boninchi SA, is characteristic of the period and notably unsigned, predating the widespread use of the Patek Philippe logo on such components. Powering the watch is the calibre 27 SC, a refined automatic movement distinguished by its double Geneva Seal applied to the bridges, an exceptional mark of quality and finishing that underscores the Manufacture's uncompromising standards. What elevates this example into the realm of exceptional rarity is its dial. Manufactured by Stern Frères, the "Type 1A" geometric black dial with gilt graphics represents an extraordinarily rare configuration. The applied indexes, as seen in early series of the reference, alternate between faceted square and dagger forms, lending rhythm and architectural sophistication to the display. To the best of our knowledge, only four gold reference 2508 watches are known with this black geometric dial configuration. Notably, another example to have appeared at auction in recent years bears a case number just one digit apart from the present watch, further emphasizing the exclusivity of this production. Offered with an 18k gold herringbone bracelet and accompanied by an Extract from the Archives, this reference 2508 stands as a remarkable confluence of rarity, design, and historical importance, an opportunity to acquire one of the most elusive and visually striking Calatravas ever produced.

First introduced at Watches & Wonders 2025, the Gerald Charles Maestro GC Sport Tennis is a vivid and singular reinterpretation of the esteemed Maestro collection, one rooted in the very DNA of Gérald Genta's design ethos

yet boldly re-engineered for performance. Drawing its striking colour inspiration from the bright yellow of a tennis ball, the grained Optic Yellow dial features applied Arabic numerals at 3, 9 and 12 o'clock and polished baton indices, all filled with Super-LumiNova for legibility that effortlessly bridges sport and everyday wear. Housed in a dark-blasted Grade 5 titanium Maestro case measuring 39 mm by 41 mm with a slim 9 mm profile, this watch is engineered with both comfort and resilience in mind. At just 64 grams, it is exceptionally light on the wrist, while the left-hand crown (a deliberate ergonomic choice) ensures interference-free wear during spirited activity. At its heart beats the ultra-thin automatic Calibre GCA 3002, developed in collaboration with Vaucher Manufacture Fleurier, offering a 50-hour power reserve and finished with refined Geneva stripes and perlage visible through the sapphire caseback. The central rotor, engraved with Gerald Charles' signature honeycomb motif and a special 25th anniversary logo, is a reminder that even performance-oriented pieces from this maison carry a depth of watchmaking pedigree. Produced in a limited edition of only 200 pieces, this Maestro GC Sport Tennis is a compelling fusion of heritage, sport-driven ergonomics and independent Swiss craftsmanship.

Produced in the mid-20th century, the reference 6517 represents the Lady Date in its most elegant and collectible form. 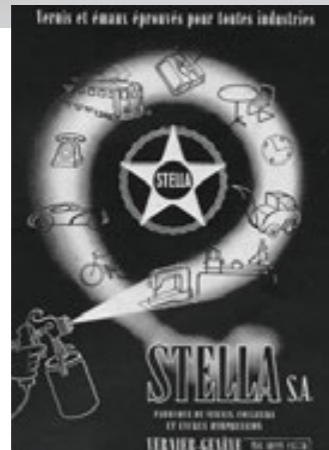

This Rolex Day-Date platinum Stella dial Octopus stands as one of the most extravagant and elusive expressions ever created within the Day-Date lineage, an extraordinary convergence of rarity, craftsmanship, and unapologetic opulence that elevates it far beyond the realm of traditional wristwatches. Introduced in 1956, the Rolex

Day-Date quickly became a symbol of prestige, yet only a minute fraction of its production reached the level of artistic and technical ambition seen here. Crafted in platinum and manufactured in 1972, this exceptional example is fitted with the highly coveted burgundy Stella dial, produced using a complex multi-layer lacquer technique that results in a deep, vibrant, almost enamel-like finish, one of the most desirable dial types among collectors. The lavishness continues with a bezel set with 46 round-cut diamonds, framing the dial with striking brilliance. However, the true centerpiece is the extraordinary President bracelet, a masterpiece of gem-setting affectionately known among collectors as the octopus. Each link is meticulously adorned with raised round-cut diamonds flanking a central baguette-cut diamond, creating a sculptural, almost architectural effect reminiscent of articulated jewelry at the highest level. Preserved in outstanding condition, this watch represents the pinnacle of Rolex's most daring creations of the 1970s, a period when the brand explored bold aesthetics and exceptional gem-setting techniques. 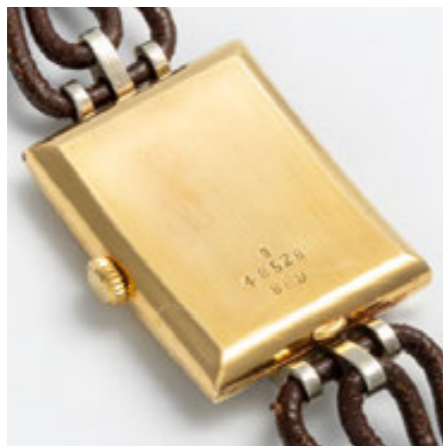

A highly unusual and undeniably charming Rolex reference 869, this rectangular wristwatch beautifully illustrates a lesser-seen, more expressive side of the brand's early production, where elegance and creativity took precedence over convention. Crafted in yellow gold with contrasting white gold components, the case displays refined proportions and a pleasing architectural presence, enhanced by its softly aged dial with stylized Arabic numerals and blued hands. Yet it is the construction of the lugs that truly sets

this piece apart. Rather than traditional fixed or straight lugs, the watch features articulated attachments with triple loop connectors, seamlessly linking the case to its decorative cord strap. This inventive design introduces both flexibility and a distinct visual rhythm, lending the watch a jewelry-like sophistication rarely encountered in Rolex wristwatches. The interplay between precious metals and organic materials, gold, steel links, and braided leather, creates a tactile and aesthetic richness that speaks to the experimental spirit of the period. It is a design that feels both intimate and refined, conceived not merely as an instrument, but as an ornament to be worn and appreciated. Reference 869 examples of this configuration are seldom seen, particularly in such honest and attractive condition. The peculiarity of the articulated system, combined with the watch's elegant restraint, results in a piece of quiet but compelling charisma. A fascinating departure from Rolex's more familiar codes, this watch stands as a reminder that even the most established maisons have moments of bold creativity, moments that today offer collectors something truly distinctive and deeply personal.

Within the legendary lineage of the Rolex Daytona, certain references transcend their already iconic status to reach a level reserved for the most discerning collectors. Reference 6264 is undeniably one of these. Produced for a remarkably short period between the late 1960s and early 1970s, it represents a transitional yet highly distinc-

tive chapter in the evolution of the model. What immediately defines the 6264 is its black acrylic bezel with contrasting tachymeter scale, an element that gives the watch a bold, sporty character while clearly distinguishing it from its sister reference 6262. Cased in stainless steel, it combines understated elegance with the purposeful aesthetic that has made vintage Daytonas so desirable. The present example stands out for its exceptional aesthetic. The case retains strong proportions with nice lugs and well defined finishes, while the bezel remains intact, enhancing the overall visual impact. Yet it is the dial that truly elevates this watch into a different category. Its silvered surface, adorned with applied baton indexes and luminous accents, has developed a remarkable transformation over time: the subdials have aged into a rich, caramel tone, creating a striking and highly sought-after “tropical” contrast. Produced in relatively limited numbers, with only a small fraction exhibiting such distinctive aging, examples like this are increasingly difficult to encounter. A compelling combination of rarity, condition and aesthetic uniqueness, this reference 6264 perfectly embodies the enduring fascination of vintage Daytona collecting.

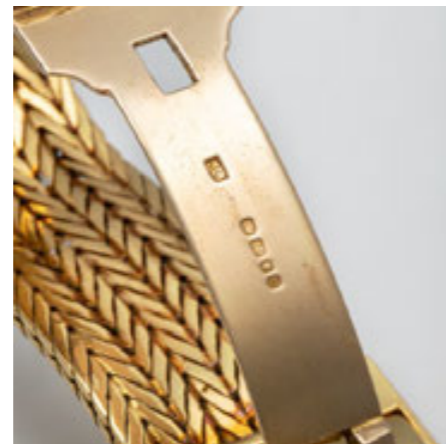

Few watches embody the elegance of the Cintrée as convincingly as this London-signed example, where proportion, curvature, and refinement converge in a particularly compelling way. Here, the elongated case, arched to follow the wrist, achieves that delicate balance between presence and grace that defines the very best executions of the model. What immediately distinguishes this piece

is its dial. The “London” signature positioned within the minute track at 6 o'clock is a detail reserved for a very small number of examples, and one that seasoned collectors recognize as both unusual and highly desirable. It lends the watch a distinct identity, subtly setting it apart from its Paris or France counterparts. Equally noteworthy is the bracelet. Crafted by Cartier and stamped with the case number and JC hallmarks, it transforms the watch into a cohesive jewel, its finely woven gold links echoing the fluidity of the curved case. The interplay between case and bracelet is seamless, elevating the piece beyond a simple wristwatch into something closer to wearable sculpture. Inside, the choice of a LeCoultre movement reflects the collaborative spirit of the era, where Cartier prioritized slimness and reliability to preserve the purity of the design. The London hallmark, dating the case to 1969, situates the watch at a fascinating moment, when traditional craftsmanship met the bold aesthetics of the late 1960s. Elegant and undeniably rare in this configuration, this Cintrée captures the essence of Cartier at its most refined: restrained, architectural, and quietly confident.

The Tank Normale is often spoken of as the origin of a design language, yet in reality it is something far more radical: a distilled concept of form, reduced to its most essential lines. Created by Cartier in the years following the First World War, it established a visual grammar that would influence not only watchmaking, but design at large, where proportion, balance, and restraint take precedence over decoration. This particular example, ren-

dered in yellow gold and accompanied by its period brick bracelet, captures that philosophy in its most compelling form. The case is defined by its measured proportions and quiet solidity, with surfaces that interact subtly with light, emphasizing structure over embellishment. Its preservation allows the original geometry to remain fully legible, retaining the clarity that defines the model. The dial offers a nuanced expression of time's passage. Roman numerals and the chemin de fer minute track remain crisp, while a gentle patina softens the composition, introducing warmth without compromising legibility, an equilibrium that collectors increasingly value. The brick bracelet, however, is where this watch transcends convention. Both complex in construction and fluid in wear, it transforms the piece into something sculptural, blurring the boundary between object and ornament. Examples combining this configuration are notably scarce, reflecting their original production for a narrow and discerning clientele. What emerges is not simply an early Tank from the 1930s, but a complete statement: an object where design intent, material execution, and rarity converge with remarkable precision.

In January 1969, Zenith unveiled the El Primero, one of the very first automatic chronograph movements ever introduced and a landmark achievement in modern horology.

Beating at a remarkable frequency of 36,000 vibrations per hour, the movement was conceived to deliver exceptional precision, a technical characteristic that would become its defining signature. The El Primero was launched across several references, most notably the stainless steel A386, A384 and A385, alongside the yellow gold G381. Among these, the A386 distinguished itself with its round case, faceted lugs and instantly recognizable overlapping “tricolor” registers, a design that would go on to become emblematic of the El Primero name. The present watch, Zenith El Primero A386 Revival Ref. 03.P386.400/07.C840, is a highly exclusive limited edition of 49 pieces created by Phillips in Association with Bacs & Russo to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the El Primero movement. Faithful to the proportions and aesthetics of the 1969 A386, this stainless steel revival retains the original 38 mm case diameter, pump pushers and sharp faceted lugs, preserving the vintage character of its predecessor. This particularly attractive example features an elegant eggshell dial complemented by three brown-toned subsidiary registers. The warm hues subtly reinterpret the historic tricolor layout of the original A386, while evoking the earthy design palettes that were prevalent at the end of the 1960s.

Presented at Baselworld 2015, the Hublot Big Bang Unico Italia Independent represents a chromatic exercise and a manifesto of Hublot's “Art of Fusion” pushed into the realm of fashion and contemporary design. Born

from the collaboration with Lapo Elkann and Italia Independent, this edition translates the world of tailoring and textile research directly onto the wrist, creating one of the boldest and most recognizable Big Bang interpretations of the last decade. The 45 mm case is crafted in Texalium, a fiberglass-based composite coated with aluminum, here rendered in an intense electric blue that plays continuously with light. Unlike traditional carbon fiber, Texalium allows for vivid color while preserving lightness and strength, giving the watch an almost iridescent, fabric-like appearance. The effect is unmistakable: technical, modern, and unmistakably Italian in flair. The openworked dial reveals the in-house HUB1242 Unico chronograph movement, a flyback calibre with column wheel visible on the dial side and approximately 72 hours of power reserve. Blue applied numerals and hands echo the case tone, creating a coherent and highly graphic aesthetic. True to the Italia Independent concept, the strap plays a central role: a denim-effect fabric upper bonded to a rubber backing, complete with contrasting stitching, reinforces the link to contemporary fashion and the idea of a watch that behaves like a tailored accessory rather than a purely technical instrument.

num and reflects a shared pursuit of technical innovation, mechanical purity, and sculptural intensity. The architectural Millenary case frames a highly complex dial layout, where an off-centered display reveals the chronograph, one-minute tourbillon, and a prominent power reserve indicator, providing a constant reading of the movement's stored energy. The openworked construction exposes the finely finished calibre beneath, with bridges and gear train executed to the highest standards of haute horlogerie. Created in collaboration with Maserati, the design draws inspiration from endurance racing and high-performance engineering. The long-standing relationship between motorsport and fine watchmaking is rooted in shared principles: precision under pressure, mechanical resilience, and the translation of function into aesthetic form. Here, the Millenary MC12 becomes a distilled expression of speed and mechanics. Beneath the surface, a twin-barrel construction delivers an impressive 10-day power reserve, ensuring extended tourbillon operation, an endurance echo of the MC12's 6-litre V12 engine producing 630 horsepower. Further reinforcing its racing spirit, the chronograph is complemented by a tachymeter scale, recalling the instrumentation of a performance dashboard and underscoring its connection to speed measurement. Few watch designs can claim true icon status: the Cartier Santos is unquestionably one of them. Created in 1904 for the pioneering aviator Alberto Santos-Dumont, it stands among the earliest purpose-built wristwatches, introducing a bold square form that would forever influence watch design. Its architectural case, defined by exposed screws and balanced proportions, remains instantly recognizable

more than a century later. This example reinterprets that enduring design through a far more exclusive lens. Crafted entirely in platinum, it transforms the Santos into an object of tangible presence. The bracelet further enhances this cohesion, with diamond-set links seamlessly integrated into the design, extending the watch's jewelled character without compromising its structural identity. Powered by an automatic movement, the watch retains its functional roots, offering reliability beneath its refined exterior. The present lot represents an exceptionally rare and highly sought-after iteration of Cartier's most poetic form: the Baignoire. The name itself is thought to derive either from the French word for "bathtub," evoking its softly elongated oval silhouette, or from the "baignoire" boxes of the Paris Opéra, those elegant, curved-front seats at stage level reserved for distinguished guests. Both associations capture the spirit of intimacy, refinement, and subtle theatricality that defines this design. Cartier had been experimenting with oval forms as early as the first years of the 20th century, long before the shape was formally intro-

duced into the maison's catalogue under the name "Ovale" in 1958. It was only in 1973 that the now-iconic designation "Baignoire" was officially adopted. The present watch, however, predates this formal naming, placing it within a fascinating and transitional period of Cartier's design history. Even within this already rare lineage, the "Oblique" configuration stands apart. Characterized by a case rotated approximately 30 degrees relative to the strap, the design introduces a dynamic asymmetry that feels both daring and effortlessly elegant. This subtle yet striking shift transforms the watch from a classical oval into a sculptural object, enhancing its presence on the wrist while maintaining perfect harmony. The example offered here was produced in London and crafted in yellow gold, bearing the traditional English hallmarks. The presence of the date letter "m" allows us to confidently attribute its production to circa 1967. London-made Cartier pieces from this era are themselves highly sought-after, distinguished by their artisanal character and unique regulatory markings. To the best of our knowledge, only two other examples of the Baignoire Oblique are known to exist. The present watch, numbered 10546, sits chronologically between these two recorded pieces, numbered 10545 and 10548. The Rolex Oyster Chronograph reference 6034 represents one of the most historically significant and elusive chapters in Rolex's chronograph lineage, an early, transitional masterpiece that directly paved the way for the birth of the Daytona. Introduced in 1950, the reference 6034 holds the distinction of being one of the very first Oyster-cased chronograph ever manufactured by Rolex. The present example is particularly compelling. 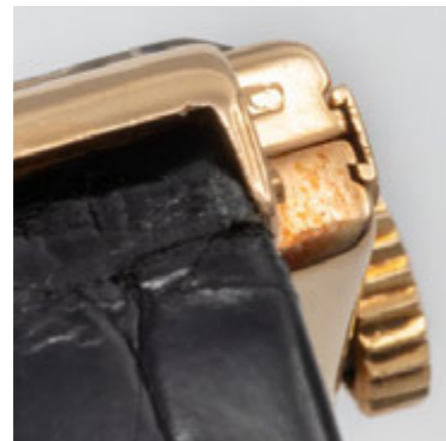

A watch that immediately invites a more attentive gaze, not through excess, but through proportion, balance, and quiet conviction. The square form, compact yet assertive of reference 1486, reflects a moment in time when watchmaking began to move beyond the purely utilitarian and into a more architectural expression. The reference 1486 occupies a particularly important place within that evolution. Introduced in 1940, it represents one of Patek

What we have here is not merely a minaudière, nor simply a concealed watch, but a small manifesto of 1930s Parisian sophistication, an age when vanity cases were engineered with the same seriousness as grand complications, and when the line between haute fashion and horology was deliciously blurred. The diamond-set bezel and lugs frame the dial with just enough brilliance, never overwhelming the design, but instead elevating it, an approach Cartier has mastered like no other. 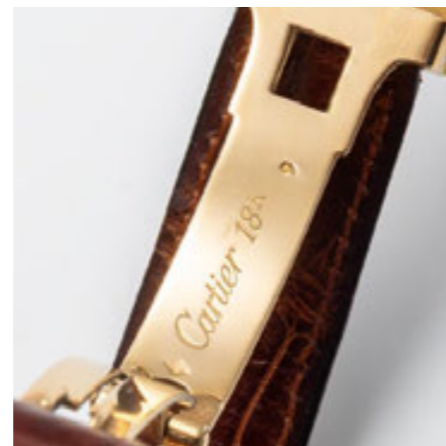

The present Cartier Tank with highly unusual design with strap completely integrated, is a fascinating and unconventional reinterpretation of one of the most iconic wristwatch designs ever created. Conceived from Louis Cartier's 1917 vision and inspired by the Renault FT-17, the Tank has remained a pillar of timeless design, evolving with changing tastes while preserving its unmistakable Art Deco identity. An exceptional and deeply evocative minute repeating pocket watch in 14K pink gold, this remarkable timepiece was produced circa 1900 and is distinguished by the inner caseback inscription, "Horlogers de sa Majesté l'Empereur de Russie." This designation identifies the maker as an official watchmaker to the court of Tsar Nicholas II and the Romanov dynasty, underscoring the prestigious standing of the maison within the Imperial Russian court, rather than indicating that the watch itself was made specifically for the Tsar. Opening the cuvette reveals a richly engraved inner cover signed

"Audemars Frères, Brassus & Genève," framed by a constellation of finely executed medallions celebrating the manufacture's awards and distinctions. Founded in the Vallée de Joux, Audemars Frères stood among the most respected makers of complicated movements, supplying elite retailers and royal patrons alike. Their legacy would later contribute to the foundation of modern Audemars Piguet, anchoring this watch within one of the most important lineages in Swiss watchmaking. The generously proportioned pink gold case, with its elegant curves and hinged cover, has acquired a soft, even patina that speaks to both age and careful preservation. Beneath the restrained white dial, the true virtuosity of the piece is concealed. Activated by the slide, the minute repeater chimes the hours, quarters and minutes with clarity and refinement, a mechanical symphony emblematic of the highest achievements of its era. Combining technical excellence, distinguished craftsmanship and undeniable royal provenance, this watch stands as a rare and charismatic witness to a vanished world, one where time was not only measured, but performed.

Founded in 1860, Chopard has long distinguished itself through a unique dual identity, combining fine watchmaking with a strong jewelry-driven aesthetic. This approach became particularly evident in the late 20th century, when the maison explored bold, design-led creations that blurred the line between timepiece and jewel. Introduced in the early 1980s, the St. Moritz collection marked a turning point for the brand. Conceived as

Chopard's answer to the emerging luxury sports watch category, it is defined by its round case, screwed bezel, and integrated bracelet, combining robustness with elegance in a highly recognizable design. The collection quickly established itself as one of the maison's signatures, appreciated for its versatility and distinctive presence on the wrist. The present example faithfully reflects these codes. The structured bezel with visible screws and the integrated bracelet create a cohesive, architectural look, while maintaining excellent wearability. Its blue dial configuration enhances the overall balance of the watch, adding depth and contrast without overpowering the design. The tone pairs naturally with the case and bracelet, contributing to a refined yet sporty aesthetic, while applied markers ensure clarity and visual harmony. Powering the watch is the renowned Frederic Piguet-based calibre 1185, celebrated for its slim profile and high-quality chronograph construction, further elevating the model's horological appeal.

The Hublot Big Bang Tourbillon Monopusher Chronograph belongs to a chapter in modern horology where excess is not indulgence, but intention. Introduced in the wake of Jean-Claude Biver's transformative vision for Hublot in the mid-2000s, the Big Bang was never conceived as a

discreet timekeeper. First, the fusion of platinum, titanium, and ceramic: Hublot's now-famous doctrine of "Art of Fusion" finds in this watch one of its purest articulations. Platinum, noble and dense. Titanium, light and resilient. Ceramic, modern and virtually impervious. With a fully skeletonized dial, the movement reveals itself without hesitation. An exceptionally early and refined example of Patek Philippe's rectangular wristwatch production, this timepiece, manufactured in 1929, beautifully illustrates the maison's transition into shaped watches during the inter-war period. Its design reflects both technical innovation

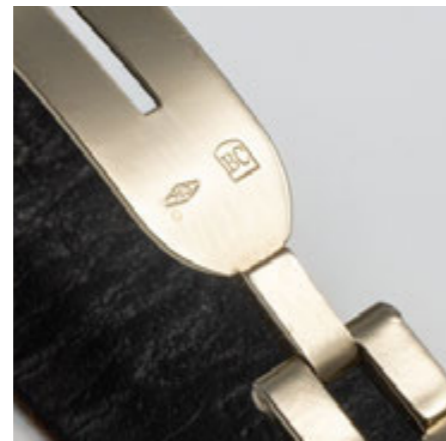
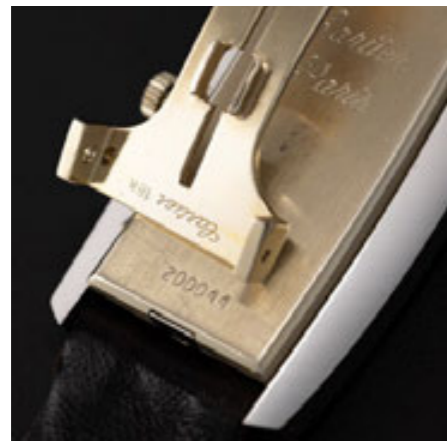

The Tank Cintrée is definitely unmistakable: an object so distinctive in its proportions that it transcends fashion entirely. Elongated, curved, and designed to follow the natural line of the wrist, the Cintrée has always represented the most architectural interpretation of the Tank family. Here, that sculptural form is elevated further through

the addition of diamonds, transforming an already refined design into something altogether more luminous. The case, in white gold, becomes a frame for light itself, each stone carefully set to enhance rather than overwhelm the purity of the lines. What adds an additional layer of fascination is the collaboration behind this piece. Both the case and movement bear the signature of Vacheron, a reminder of a time when the great maisons worked in close dialogue, sharing expertise and craftsmanship. The dial, fully set with diamonds, abandons traditional conventions of legibility in favour of texture and brilliance. And yet, the time remains perfectly readable, subtly indicated, never imposed. Among the rarest and most elusive expressions of early Rolex Datejust reference 6304 production, this particular example occupies a category of its own, where rarity, material, and configuration converge in a way seldom encountered even among the most seasoned collectors. It is not merely a variation, but a watch that challenges the very perception of what a vintage Datejust can be. Introduced in the early 1950s, the Datejust had already redefined the modern wristwatch with its automatic movement and instantaneous date display. The reference 6304, with its smooth bezel, embodies the most

restrained and elegant interpretation of this innovation. However, the present watch elevates this foundation to an entirely different level. Its platinum case, an exceptionally uncommon choice for the period, imbues the watch with a discreet yet unmistakable presence, far removed from the more familiar steel or gold examples. The dial is equally remarkable: a matte grey surface enhanced by a refined arrangement of brilliant and baguette cut diamond indexes. Rather than appearing decorative, the setting is perfectly balanced, preserving the sobriety and legibility expected of a Rolex from this era. The importance of this watch is further underscored by its inclusion in John Goldberger’s seminal book 100 Superlative Rolex Watches (pages 166–167), a reference work reserved for only the most exceptional pieces. Moreover, two comparable examples of the same reference, albeit with different configurations, one without date and another retailed by Serpico y Laino, have appeared at Monaco Legend Group, achieving world record results for the reference. The overall condition further amplifies its appeal, with the case retaining strong, well defined proportions. The Jubilee bracelet complements the watch naturally, reinforcing its identity as both a refined and versatile piece. With only a handful of known examples, this reference 6304 transcends the notion of a collectible and enters the realm of landmark timepieces: an object of study, desire, and significance, destined for the most discerning collections where rarity alone is no longer sufficient, and only the truly exceptional endures.

The present Patek Philippe reference 3441 with its special platinum checker dial stands among the most elusive and intellectually fascinating creations ever produced by Patek Philippe: a watch conceived not for mass production, but for a handful of the most discerning clients, executed vir-

tually piece by piece. Introduced in 1959, the reference 3441 represents an extraordinary departure from conventional Patek Philippe design. Unlike standard models, it was never truly part of serial production, but rather created in extremely limited numbers, each example displaying unique characteristics. The earliest executions were fitted with the calibre 12-600, though no surviving examples are known today. From 1960 onward, production transitioned to the calibre 27-460, and to date, only six examples have been publicly identified. The present watch is among the rarest of these, most possibly unique in its configuration. Cased in platinum, it features the exceptional "checker" or braided dial (motif repeater on the bracelet), engraved on a platinum base and manufactured by Stern Frères. The interplay of light across its textured surface creates a remarkable visual depth. The 35mm case is a refined example of discreet luxury, made by Geneva casemaker F. Baumgartner, featuring a waterproof screw-down back and a diamond-set bezel with 40 stones totaling over 3 carats. The bracelet, furthermore, was produced and signed by JPE, Jean-Pierre Ecoffey, one of Geneva's most respected bracelet makers, whose work perfectly complements the watch's highly sophisticated aesthetic and artisanal character. With only six examples identified across all variations (at the moment) and possibly no more than twenty ever produced, the reference 3441 occupies a realm beyond rarity. It is a watch that bridges haute horlogerie, high jewelry, and bespoke craftsmanship. For the advanced collector, the present one is the opportunity to secure one of the most mysterious and important post-war creations of Patek Philippe, a piece whose scarcity, individuality, and historical intrigue place it firmly among the great treasures of vintage watchmaking.

The reference 3450 occupies a very special place in the lineage of Patek Philippe perpetual calendars, standing at the crossroads between classical mid-century construction and the more modern interpretations that would follow. Manufactured over a short span in the early 1980s and in notably small quantities, it remains one of the least encountered serial perpetual calendars from the maison.

Its generous yellow gold case is immediately recognizable, defined by its wide stance, sharp lugs and sloping bezel that together create a presence both confident and refined. Despite the technical sophistication of the watch, the dial achieves a rare sense of equilibrium: each indication is clearly articulated, yet nothing feels crowded or forced, an enduring testament to Patek Philippe's design discipline. Inside, the automatic caliber 27-460Q: built upon one of its most respected base movements, it combines robustness with refined finishing, offering not only mechanical excellence but also aesthetic pleasure for those who take the time to observe it closely. What makes this particular example especially compelling is the addition of a sapphire display back. While not part of the original delivery, it is fitted with internal markings consistent with the rest of the watch, suggesting it was produced with careful attention under special request of the first client. Whether commissioned later or fitted during servicing, it provides an uncommon opportunity to appreciate a movement that is usually hidden from view. The presence of accompanying documentation, along with recorded servicing history from Beyer, including explicit requests to preserve the case's original surfaces, further enhances the watch's appeal, pointing to ownership by a collector attentive to both condition and authenticity. Altogether, this reference 3450 offers a nuanced blend of rarity, character and horological substance, making it a particularly rewarding piece for those drawn to the quieter, more intellectual side of collecting.

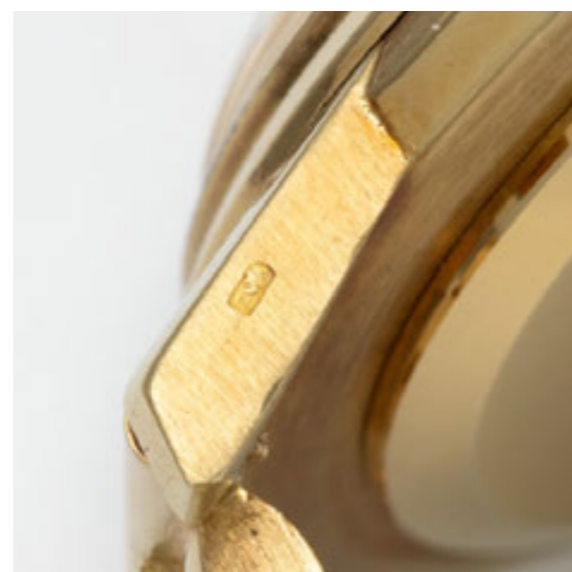

Among the most mythical and intellectually compelling creations ever produced by Patek Philippe, reference 3449 stands as an exercise in extraordinary audacity, a watch that not only belongs to the lineage of perpetual calendar wristwatches, but quietly redefines it. Conceived during a period when the manufacture had already embraced structured, reference based production, the present watch defies that logic through an almost experimental and deeply introspective approach. In the post-war era, Patek Philippe increasingly standardized its output, even among its most complicated creations. Yet on exceedingly rare occasions, the manufacture produced references in vanishingly small numbers, not as special commissions, but as discreet explorations of design, mechanics, and client reception. Reference 3449 is perhaps the most refined expression of this philosophy. Only three examples of this perpetual calendar wristwatch were ever produced, all bearing consecutive movement numbers, an extraordinary detail that underscores the deliberate exclusivity of the series. Mechanically, it diverges from its contemporaries: rather than the calibre 27 SC QP or 27-460 QP found in other perpetual calendar references of the era, it

is powered by the rarer manual winding calibre 23-300 Q, reinforcing its highly experimental character. Equally striking is the case itself. Measuring 37.5 mm, remarkably bold for the early 1960s, it features a sophisticated multi faceted bezel paired with elongated, sharply angled lugs. The result is a design of commanding presence yet remarkable elegance, elevated further by the interplay of polished and satin brushed surfaces that animate the watch with subtle dynamism. Today, all three examples are accounted for. One resides permanently in the Patek Philippe Museum, while another remains secured within an important private collection. The present watch, last offered publicly in 2004 during Osvaldo Patrizzi's celebrated era at Antiquorum, achieved the extraordinary result of CHF 1,766,250. It has remained in the same collection ever since, its significance only deepening with time. Adding further emotional resonance, the caseback bears a deeply personal engraving: a name accompanied by two dates, one presumed to commemorate a birth and the other a 30th birthday celebration. Beneath appears the French phrase "Plus qu'hier, moins que demain", "More than yesterday, less than tomorrow", the celebrated line by the poet Rosemonde Gérard, transforming the watch from a purely horological masterpiece into an intimate object of affection and memory. Originally sold in 1965 by the Dallas jeweller Linz Brothers to Texas real estate developer George E. Poston for USD 5,500, the watch has passed through only a handful of important collections over the decades. When it reappeared publicly in 2014, Mr. Poston himself contributed to the catalogue, recalling both his passion for collecting and his enduring appreciation for Patek Philippe. Remarkably, despite the passage of time and several changes in ownership, the present example has remained preserved in exceptionally crisp condition. The case retains its strong proportions, sharp finishing, and deep hallmarks, while the dial remains beautifully clean and original, showing only the faintest and most attractive aging to its silvered surface. Its original purpose remains intriguingly uncertain. Produced in the transitional period between the discontinuation of references 2497 and 2438/1 and the introduction of the landmark reference 3448, the reference 3449 is widely believed to have been an experimental series, perhaps intended to gauge the reactions of the manufacture's leadership and its most important clients. Significantly, all known examples were sold only after the commercial success of the 3448. Reference 3449 is not merely rare, it is historically consequential. With one example permanently institutionalized, ownership is effectively limited to only two watches worldwide. For the most discerning collectors, it represents not simply an acquisition, but a defining cornerstone of scholarship and connoisseurship: perhaps the final chapter in the pursuit of ultimate horological completeness.
